DEPLORE GAMBLING

Methodists Hand a Bouquet
to the Governor-General

"We deplore the widespread vice of
gambling, and especially the encour-
agement given to it in connection
with horse racing. We regret that
the demoralizing institution at the
Woodbine is opened semi-annually
under the patronage of his majesty's
representative, the Governor-General.
While conceding him the right to re-
gulate his own private conduct, yet
we feel that one who occupies such
a position should not lend his in-
fluence to aid an enterprise so vicious
in its tendencies."

This bouquet was handed to his ex-
cellency by the Toronto Methodist
conference last week in a clause in
the report of the committee on tem-
perance and moral reform, added by
direct instruction of the conference.

"We insist on a righteous interpre-
tation and enforcement of the law
against gambling everywhere," the
report continued. "And such amend-
ment to the criminal code as will
facilitate the prevention and prose-
cution of all betting, especially in
connection with horse racing, either
on race tracks or any other place,
public or private, whether the par-
ties are standing, sitting or walking
about, and that a copy of this re-
commendation be sent to the Domi-
nion Premier, Minister of Justice and
the leader of the Opposition."

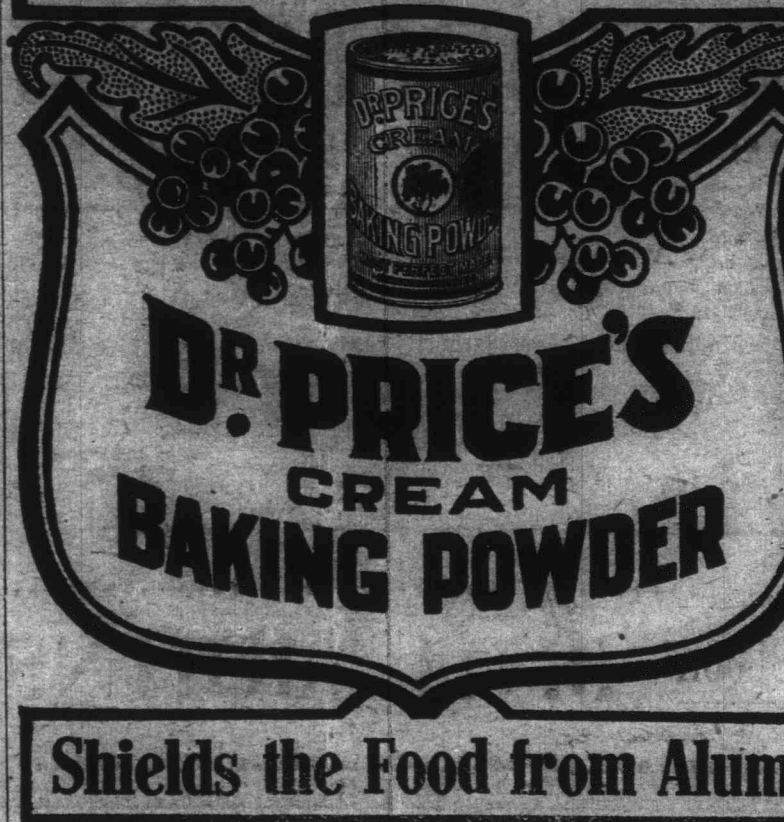

REFUNDED \$800

Evidence before Judge Cassels
show that Officials were steal-
ing

Ottawa, June 18.—Startling evi-
dence was elicited at the Marine En-
quiry before Justice Cassels today
when Auditor General Fraser was on
the stand. He said he had absolutely
no confidence in the certificates of
fair prices for goods given by the
three principle officials of the depart-
ment. Col. Girard, Deputy Minister,
J. F. Fraser, commissioner of lights,
and Commander Spain, commissioner
of wrecks. Mr. Fraser was particu-
larly hard on Commander Spain, who
he said, had in one year been com-
pelled to refund \$800 over charges
for travelling. The charges had been
actually made when he was not out-
side the city. The auditor general
had experienced great difficulty in
getting particulars from the depart-
ment, as to the movement of offi-
cials. In one instance a record which
he should have had was torn up and

thrown into the waste paper bas-
ket. In the opening of the sitting,
Judge Cassels referred in scathing
terms to the developments of yester-
day, when it was shown that the
Canadian Food Signal Company had
made an immense profit out of the
sale of Diaphanous to the department.

To Electrify Ontario

The plan to electrify the province
of Ontario, Canada, with power from
Niagara Falls, fully described in the
July Popular-Mechanics, is undoubt-
edly the most stupendous undertak-
ing of this character ever projected.
The article states:

"The first contract with the Com-
mission was signed by Toronto, and
calls for 10,000 hp., the first supply
to be delivered to that city in De-
cember, 1909. Among other cities
that signed contracts are London,
Hamilton, St. Thomas, Woodstock,
Guelph, Berlin, Stratford, Preston,
Galt and Ingersoll. Toronto will pay
\$18.10 per horsepower per year, and
St. Thomas \$26.50 per year. The
prices the other cities will pay range
between these figures, according to
distance from source of supply and
amount of supply contracted for. As
soon as the lines feeding these cities
are completed a line will be run to
Windsor, 47 miles from the falls.
"The undertaking which is now
reaching culmination is a gigantic
one, furnishing as it will, the power
to light cities, run electric railways
and drive the heavy machinery of
hundreds of manufacturing concerns.
A map accompanying the article
gives a clear idea of the territory to
be covered by the system."

Game Preserves

The Saskatchewan Game Protec-
tion Association has sent the following
petition to the Minister of the In-
terior at Ottawa:

"(a) Whereas, the preservation of
insectivorous and game birds is es-
sential to agriculture, to forestry,
and to the healthy, many develop-
ment guaranteed only by outdoor
sport, and

"(b) whereas all ground nesting
birds which breed in colonies nest on
small islands; and

"(c) Whereas further such islands
are not desirable or suitable for set-
tlement,

"Therefore we hereby petition that
you will finally withdraw these from
the lands offered for settlement and
declare them to be game and bird
havens forever."

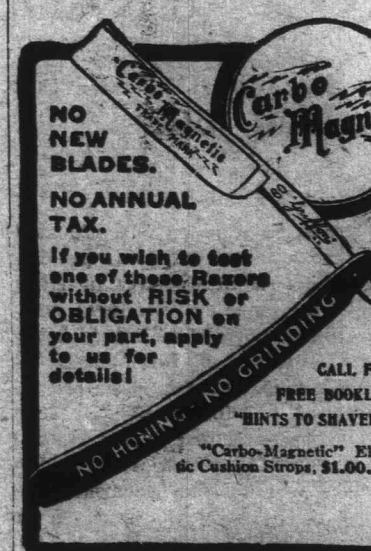
