## Cartoon Comments.

Leading Cartoon. - If we may trust the cvidence of judges, medical men, travellers and others whose business in life brings them into contact with socicty at large, the Rum Traffic is the ample explanation of seven tenths of the poverty, misery, discase and death in any country where it is established and protected by law.
