

Provincial Government releases throne speech. Disabled Persons Council Reacts To Speech

The Premier's Council on the Status of Disabled Persons held a full Council meeting over the weekend and reviewed the recent Throne Speech from the perspective of disabled persons.

Council Chairperson, Paul Bourque, stated that the members were happy to note that the government plans to continue support for sound and effective social programs that will allow full human dignity for citizens in need.

References were made to such particular items as improving the availability of accessible transportation, the upcoming Task Force on Housing, improved and equitable health care services, and further improvements to the Workers' Compensation Board.

Mr. Bourque said that the Council will be looking at the proposed Office of Childhood Services with great interest and will be offering input to the government on the needs of disabled children.

While these matters will obviously be of direct impact on

the disabled community, Mr. Bourque felt that other initiatives in educational services and employment programs will also benefit disabled persons as well as the general population.

The Council will be monitoring the progress of government activity in the current session of the Legislature to see how the budgets, legislation and programs of specific Departments will relate to the

needs of the disabled community. The Throne Speech is not the final measure of government support.

In summary, Mr. Bourque revealed that although the Throne Speech did not cover

every subject of interest to the Council and disabled persons, he felt that there was a reasonable amount of evidence that the current government has not forgotten the needs of persons with disabilities.
