Problem of Pol. Philos. is relation of the individual to the State. Pol. Econ. as approached from the point of Pol. Philos. involves the relation of man's physical wants to this relation.

It was after Aristotle that divided into 2 schools. Stoics & Epicureans - Peripatetic School & Academy survived. These schools were found chiefly at Athens.

But situation began to change in 4th century, with the conquest of Alexander and the Hellenizing of Asia Minor, Syria & Egypt. Other centres arose as under the Ptolemies. Alexandria.

Then Greece was conquered by Rome. & great migration of Greek professional teachers to Rome. Was fashion in Rome to have Greek culture. And so speculations on Greek side were acclimatized to Roman climate.

Zeno 300 B.C. we have none of his writings.

Followed by Chrysippus 250 B.C. was much quoted by Cicero and so reached the modern world.
