

The Assistant General Manager added that it might be possible to purchase the property at Bay-Cumberland very reasonably. This would involve a considerable change in the Corporation's plans for new buildings in Toronto.

After some discussion, it was decided that the Assistant General Manager should make a preliminary investigation of the whole situation and report to the next meeting.

(6) The Assistant General Manager reported that the studios at Quebec City in the Chateau Frontenac were inadequate and that it was considered advisable, if possible, to move the studios to the Palais Montcalm. He estimated the cost of this removal would be in the nature of \$65,000. It was the feeling of the meeting that the Toronto situation was much more serious and demanded immediate attention, while Quebec was in the same category as Halifax, and as the expenditure could not be afforded at the present time, the matter had best be left in abeyance.

(7) The Assistant General Manager reported that the Conference at Washington had proceeded satisfactorily and that the Havana Agreement would come into effect as planned on the 29th March, 1941. He stated further that the difficulty regarding the use of 1010 kilocycles for CBY in Toronto had been cleared up as had the problem of CJBR, Rimouski, and WFBR, Baltimore. The latter settlement would involve no increase in power to 5000 watts by CJBR, Rimouski.

(8) The correspondence with the Association of Technical Employees was read and discussion ensued regarding the union activities in Toronto. It was decided to ask a representative of the Department of Labour to attend the meeting and express Government policy. Mr. M.S. Campbell of the Fair Wages and Conciliation Branch attended.
