The result of yesterday's civic election didn't come as a surprise to many but it is certain that at least a few of the candidates were surprised. All the old council, who sought re-election, were returned with the exception of Ald. Edmondson. A mistake in the returns giving Ald. Taylor 67 instead of 67 votes at No. 1 division (Thomson's) gave Andrew Thomson as elected. The mistake of ten was discovered about nine o'clock, however, and Ald. Taylor was found to be re-elected by a majority over Andrew Thomson of three.

Whether the mistake was a clerical error and The Planet extra was right, it is impossible to say, but the City Clerk had no power to re-count the ballots and had to take the figures as handed in by the deputy returning officer, Joseph Northwood.

The City Clerk this afternoon officially declared Messrs. W. E. McKeough, Archie McCoig, G. W. Cowan, Wilfrid Fleming, W. S. Marshall, Wm. O'Brien, John Waddell, E. A. Mounter, and G. G. Taylor elected as aldermen, and Messrs. Benson, Cornish and Heyward elected as school trustees.

The result of the civic election was generally highly satisfactory and even the defeated candidates have little reason for regret. They have the knowledge that they put up a good fight.

With the exception of Ald. McKeough and Ald. McCoig, the rest of the aldermanic aspirants were fairly well hunched.

The result in the various wards in the contest for school trustees was about what was expected, although it was the general opinion that the contest in North Chatham would be close, which was once where the general opinion was wrong.

The City Clerk doesn't make his official declaration in regard to the by-law till Thursday, but it is expected by a substantial majority. It required 900 votes for the by-law to carry it, whereas over 1,100 ratepayers voted for the by-law so that nearly 200 votes more than were needed were cast for the by-law. It is better to have too many than too few.

GIFTS TO BAND.

Shortly after the results became known the Excelsior Band turned out in full force and serenaded the successful candidates. The Band was royally treated by all the aldermen-elect.

This morning President George Webber received the following communication from Alderman-elect McKeough, accompanied by a cheque for \$100, for which he asks The Planet to express the Band's thanks:

Nothing can, however, be learned definitely until the aldermen-elect get together in caucus.

TORONTO.

The expected happened to-day when Mayor Howland defeated W. F. MacLean, M. P., in the Mayoralty contest, by a majority of 4,652. The majority, however, was considered less than was anticipated. The vote was 13,424 for Howland, 8,775 for MacLean, and 633 for Woodley, the Socialist. The total vote, 22,832, was considerably below the average, as it was 24,944 in 1901 and 26,847 in 1900. This shows that there was a good deal of apathy among the electors. Mayor Howland, among the electors, after the polls closed, said the decisive victory over Mr. MacLean would show the people of Canada that the great city of Toronto wished its affairs conducted on business principles, and did not take Mr. MacLean's promise of things he could not perform. The by-law to provide \$133,000 for a new main building and dairy building for the Industrial Exhibition was carried by 5,097 for. The intention is to have the building ready in time for this year's exhibition. There are very few changes in the aldermanic list. Twenty-three

out of the 24 aldermen ran for re-election and were all returned except Ald. Cox, Henry Sheard, J. R. Starr, Dr. Fraleigh, and W. W. Hodgson. The new men in the council are F. S. Spence, who comes back at the head of the poll in the second ward, R. Fleming, and S. Curry, a well-known architect, John Dunn, for many years in council.

OTTAWA.

The victory of two labor candidates in to-day's municipal elections were a feature of the results. Three candidates were in the field and the two successful men were elected in the leading wards—Central and Wellington. P. D. Ross, editor of the Journal, polled the largest vote ever given an alderman in Ottawa. The race cry in the two French wards resulted in the return of three French candidates in each of these wards. A majority of 1,000 was given in favor of establishing municipal telephones; the ratepayers, by a majority of 900 endorsed a special tax for hospitals, and a majority of 1,200 was given on the question of abolishing the parks board.

HAMILTON.

The municipal elections here to-day excited very little interest, if being a foregone conclusion that Mayor Hendrie would defeat his opponent, Wm. Barrett, Socialist, by an overwhelming majority. In the aldermanic contest this was the first time on which the new by-law electing the aldermen from the city at large, instead of from the different wards, was tried, and as was generally predicted, the vote was polled very slowly, and the results were long delayed after the poll closed. Forty-one candidates qualified for the honor of sitting at the council board, of whom 21 only could be elected. Out of the 21 aldermen elected to-day 15 are Conservatives and 6 Reformers. In the vote for mayor the following are the figures—

Mayor J. S. Hendrie, 5,133; W. Barrett, Socialist (labor), 1,782—majority for Hendrie, 3,351. Two by-laws were voted on—one to issue debentures for \$25,000 for the building of a trunk sewer on Catherine street north, and the other to take \$25,000 worth of stock in the Hamilton & Caledonia Electric Railway, to be built immediately. The by-law voting resulted as follows:—Sewer by-law, for, 1,463; against, 1,397; Electric Railway by-law, for, 2,397; against, 733.
