WERE FIRED OUT

Pigott & Sons Co. finish their new fixtures, which they are now working on night and day. Mr. VonGutten is certainly fortunate in having his new store to go to.

THE PARISIAN ENQUIRY.

German Captain Left Court and the Investigation Suddenly Stopped.
Hullax, April 1.—Yesterday three officers from the Parisian, including two engineers, were called, their evidence showing that the steamer had been at a dead stop for four or five minutes previous to the collision. Counsel for the Parisian then rested their case.

The court called for "the captain of the Albano," when his counsel instructed him to leave the room, which he did, accompanied by the steamer's agent, William Roche, M. P. Counsel explained his action by saying that he questioned the authority of the court over any one on board the German ship, and while he was arguing the captain was taken away from the building.

Finally, when the court over-ruled the objection, the captain could not be found. No further evidence from the Albano being forthcoming, an adjournment was at once made.

Major-Gen. Jarvis Dead.

London, April 1.—(C. A. P.)—Major-Gen. Samuel Peter Jarvis, former commandant of the Ontario Rifles, has died at Weston-Super-Mare, aged 85. He was educated at Upper Canada College, Toronto, and as a volunteer served in the 1877 rebellion. As a regular he served in the Indian wars, during the Red River campaign, and for a time was commandant at Winnipeg, then known as Fort Garry. For his services there and elsewhere he was rewarded with the C. M. G. He was the son of Col. S. P. Jarvis, formerly superintendent-general of Indian affairs in Upper Canada.

Arm Severed by Saw.

Langton, April 1.—A painful accident happened on the farm of Mr. Chute, Walsingham, Thursday, when J. LeForge, son of Mrs. Peter Letford, had his arm taken off above the elbow. He was assisting Mr. Chute in cutting wood with steam saw when his arm came in contact with the saw.

Custom Receipts Grow.

Ottawa, April 1.—The customs receipts of the Dominion for the nine months ending with March were \$30,916,170, compared with \$30,163,283 for the same time last year, an increase of \$752,886. The receipts for the month of March were \$3,694,161, an increase of \$134,909 over March, 1904.

WRONGED HUSBAND.

Invokes Old Law and Capt. Salmon, Alleged to Have Posed as Capt. Spain, is Held.

New York, April 1.—There was an unusual turn at a private hearing before Magistrate Barlow in the Jefferson Market Police Court, Thursday, in the case of Capt. Reginald Salmon, formerly of the British army, who was recently arrested charged with causing the illness of the wife of Capt. O. G. V. Spain, who was discovered ill in a boarding house in Second avenue by his husband, who came here from their home in Ottawa, Canada. Capt. Salmon was held in \$1,000 bonds, adjournment was taken to April 15, and the case of Capt. Reginald Salmon, formerly of the British army, who is conducting the prosecution, asked that the former soldier be held until a new charge could be made.

Held on Old Statutes.
Mr. Andrews drew up a complaint under section 563 of the Penal Code, which makes the impersonation by any party as a husband guilty of a felony, and subject to a possible sentence of ten years in the penitentiary. The statute, which is an old one, provides that the real husband is the aggrieved party, and alone can prosecute. Capt. Salmon, it is alleged, posed as the husband of under the law, and charged himself to Dr. Andrew Fulton, who was arrested with him. He was held on the additional charge.

Old court attendants said that it was the first prosecution they had ever heard of under the law, and that Capt. Andrews declared he had failed to find that the law had been similarly invoked for many years.

Capt. Spain, who is the wreck master for the British Crown for the Dominion of Canada, had to return at once to sit on the case of the recent collision of the Parisian and the Albano off the harbor of Halifax.

Capt. Spain Devoted to Wife.
Mr. Andrews said that, despite the unpleasant turn of affairs, Capt. Spain is devoted to his wife. According to Mr. Andrews, Capt. Spain, who is a retired British naval officer, first met Capt. Salmon in Prince Edward Island, when the latter needed a friend. Capt. Spain not only furnished his new found acquaintance with employment, but took him to his home. Then, a few months later, Mrs. Spain disappeared and so did Capt. Salmon, and the whereabouts of the former was learned by the husband in a letter written to their sixteen-year-old son.

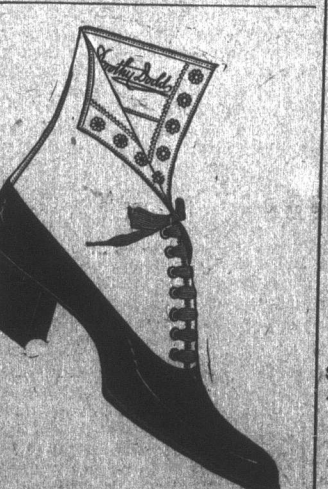
