THE MARKET

What is Lower—Live Stock Dull—The Latest Quotations.

Tuesday, Jan. 27. Toronto St. Lawrence Market.

Receipts at St. Lawrence Market were fairly large to-day and trade in all lines was more or less active.

Wheat—The prices of red and white wheat remain steady at 72c per bushel. The sales were 400 bushels white and 500 bushels of red at the above figures.

Butter—Trade was rather quiet and prices were a little firmer at 21c to 22c per lb. for pound rolls and 18c to 20c for large.

Eggs—The warm weather and the unsettled condition of the market has caused a drop in egg prices. The best new laid are quoted at 25c to 28c per dozen, with held stock at 15c to 18c.

Dressed Hogs—Trade continued a little quiet to-day, with rather limited offerings. Few are about \$7.75 to \$8.25 per cwt, although an easier feeling is evident.

Hay—Forty loads were received and sold at firmer prices than those of yesterday's quotations. No. 1 timothy sold at \$13 to \$15.50 per ton and mixed or clover was steady at \$9 to \$9.50.

Straw—Four loads were received, selling firmer at \$10 to \$11 per ton.

Toronto Live Stock.

There was little improvement in the general conditions of trade at the Toronto Cattle Market this morning. The run of stock was light and business was dull and dragging.

Butcher Cattle—The demand for the market was fair to good, a few cars of especially high quality being offered and fetching fancy prices.

Sheep and Lambs—Prices for export ewes are about steady. Culls advanced about 50c per cwt and lambs are 10c per cwt dearer at \$4 to \$4.75.

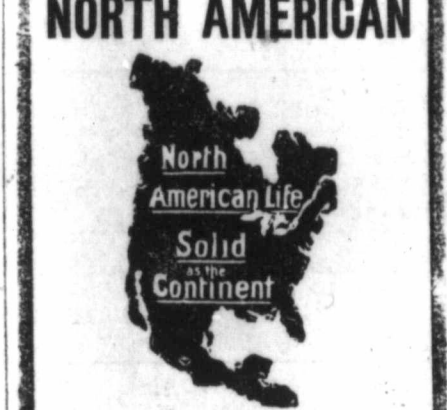

THE CANADIAN NORTHWEST

HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS

Any even numbered section of Dominion lands in Manitoba or the Northwest Territories, excepting 8 and 26, which has not been homesteaded or reserved to provide wood lots for settlers, or for other purposes, may be homesteaded upon by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres, more or less.

ENTRY

Entry may be made personally at the local land office for the district in which the land to be taken is situated, or if the homesteader desires he may, on application to the Minister of the Interior, Ottawa, the Commissioner of Immigration, Winnipeg, or the local agent for the district in which the land is situated, receive authority for some one to make entry for him. A fee of \$10 is charged for a homestead entry.

HOMESTEAD DUTIES

Under the present law homestead duties must be performed in one of the following ways, namely: (1) By at least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year during the term of three years, or—

(2) If the father (or the mother, if the father is deceased) of any person who is eligible to make a homestead entry resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for by such person as a homestead, the requirements of the law as to residence prior to obtaining patent may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother, or—

(3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by himself in the vicinity of his homestead the requirements of the law as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land.

APPLICATION FOR PATENT

Should be made at the end of the three years before the Local Agent, Sub-Agent or the Homestead Inspector. Before making application for patent the settler must give six months' notice in writing to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa of his intention to do so.

INFORMATION

Newly arrived immigrants will receive at the Immigration Office in Winnipeg, or at the Dominion Lands Office in Manitoba or the Northwest Territories, information as to the lands that are open for entry, and from the officers in charge, free of expense, advice and assistance in securing lands to suit them. Full information respecting the land, timber, coal and mineral laws, as well as respecting Dominion lands in the railway belt in British Columbia, may be obtained upon application to the Secretary of the Department of the Interior, Ottawa; the Commissioner of Immigration, Winnipeg, Manitoba, or to any of the Dominion Lands Agents in Manitoba or the Northwest Territories.
