He represented that, fiter he had for many years fulfilled il his obligations towards the society, i passed a by-law to the effect that so one connected with the liquior trafic, in which he was engaged, could enefit by, it. He therefore demanded he return of all sums paid in. The uperior Court decided that he was enfirmed by the highest court in the royline. Justices Cross and Trenolme dissented.
