Peas, oats, and spring wheat in Draper are all that could be desired. Potatoes and turnips never looked better. This is the best year we have ever had. The crops in Macaulay this year are much in advance of former years, and an abundant harvest crowns our toil.

INVENTION.—The "Oregonian" says, Mr. C. Howe, of Astoria, showed us last Saturday, an invention of his which will doubtless be highly appreciated by all equestrians. It consists of rings for girths, which are so made that the rider can tighten the girth without dismounting from his horse, by merely pul-

ling upon a strap passing through the rings. This strap is held in its place by a tongue working upon the principle of a lever, the lower end pressed upon the horse's side, and is held the more firmly the tighter the girth is drawn.
