Baltimore, Md., Dec. 3.—Several thousand Jewish citizens filled two large theatres here to-night at meetings held under the auspices of the Baltimore conference for Jewish national restoration in Palestine. The declaration of the British Government promulgated by Mr. Balfour, favoring the establishment of a Jewish national home in Palestine, was unanimously and enthusiastically approved.


