## We Have Theories, But Really Know Very Little About It.

Really, in our present state of be-  
 ing, where flesh and spirit are so  
 tenderly united to each other that  
 not the finest touch of science can  
 even guess at the point that divides  
 them, the legitimate things that min-  
 ister to bodily comfort and bodily  
 needs are essential to human hap-  
 piness, and whosever says they are  
 not says what is everlastingly not  
 so, says a writer in the St. Louis  
 Globe-Democrat. About the only  
 book that tells the naked truth as to  
 poverty is the Koran, and that de-  
 clares that it is worse than the  
 plague. And it is for shutting one  
 out from all human joy, sweetness or  
 opportunity. The poet who tells  
 us that even love, the strongest spir-  
 it force that can be brought to bear  
 upon it, dies out of the window when  
 poverty comes in at the door, covers  
 the whole ground. Love cannot mas-  
 ter it, and if love cannot nothing  
 else can. Religion may console it  
 by pointing to something better be-  
 yond, but if you want to know how  
 much happiness and grace it instills  
 into the situation here just consider  
 the position of the poor in any of  
 the aristocratic church circles, or  
 communities that you know of. Even  
 Christ Himself, though He said:  
 Blessed be ye poor, for yours is the  
 kingdom of heaven, did not promise  
 much for the kingdom of earth. The  
 worthlessness of Lazarus at the gate of  
 Dives he fully recognized, and does  
 not invite him to be happy over it.  
 Neither did He tell Martha and Mary  
 to rejoice, when they stood at the  
 grave of that other Lazarus, but  
 wept with him over the eternal sor-  
 row of death, though He knew that  
 He was to reveal to them the vic-  
 tory over it.

Indeed, the limitations and blind-  
 ness that bar the way to perfect  
 happiness here were never more fully  
 recognized than by the Lord and  
 Master of all spirit ends and forces.  
 And certainly this might be a point  
 for the psychic teachers to consider  
 who are trying to introduce us to  
 the "happiness-made-easy" process  
 along their lines. The most, per-  
 haps, that we may be compelled to  
 grant them is that man was meant  
 for happiness, since he certainly does  
 disclose capacities and aspirations in  
 that direction that would argue some  
 end or aim for it in his creation.

Moreover, pain, with her "many-  
 colored, thousand-tongued" ap-  
 peals to every inner and outer sense  
 of joy and beauty, whispers cease-  
 lessly of some lost key to nature,  
 and happiness somewhere. But, af-  
 ter all, this only shifts the matter  
 back to that rather irritating philo-  
 sophy which tells us that we were  
 made for good, meant to be lov-  
 ing, meant to be fair, when we know  
 that we are dark, crooked and cross-  
 grained in all our nature and an-  
 atomy. Who has blundered that we  
 are not what we were meant to be,  
 is the rather troublesome question  
 that, from Omar down, this admis-  
 sion of the intended good and joy  
 has been forcing upon its advocates  
 everywhere; so that we are only get-  
 ting ourselves into deep water by  
 striking out for the eternal purpose  
 in the case.

To tell the truth and admit frank-  
 ly that we do not know much about  
 happiness; but have a fond idea that  
 the bright and attractive things of  
 time were really meant to minister  
 unto it, is perhaps as honest a thing  
 as the poor mortal can do anyhow,  
 especially when he knows that, saint  
 or sinner, he intends to strive after  
 them to the end of the chapter.

Meantime, if fate does not incline to  
 favor him, there is a trick he can  
 try to outwit her which is as near  
 to the secret of the matter as any-  
 thing which science, psychic or other-  
 wise, can unfold to him.

**Absurdities in Art.**  
 Many strange conceptions in art  
 occur in the pictures of the great  
 fifteenth-century artist, Benozzo Go-  
 zoli. Three of his paintings were origi-  
 nally in the possession of the Me-  
 dici family, and portray "The  
 Journey of the Magi." Horses and  
 camels appear in the picture, capar-  
 nisoned after the fashion of the ar-  
 tist's own time.

Claude, the French artist, has  
 some curious ideas in his picture en-  
 titled "The Embarkation of the  
 Queen of Sheba." The queen, of the  
 east is descending marble steps and  
 about to enter a gondola. A huge  
 warship in the distance, whether the  
 queen is to be carried, is of the type  
 used in the days of the Spanish ar-  
 mada.

Ridicule easily kills a picture and  
 many works exhibited of late in Eng-  
 land have been downed through some  
 mistake of the artist. For instance,  
 a picture which at first attracted  
 meritorious attention was found to  
 consist of four men in a boat, ges-  
 turing a drowning woman, but all the  
 rescuers were leaning over one side  
 of the boat, which, nevertheless, re-  
 mained upright.

In the works of the old masters ex-  
 traordinary mistakes are to be  
 found. There is a well-known picture  
 representing Adam and Eve in which  
 Eve is attired in diaphanous petticoats  
 and Adam wears a coat and knee  
 breeches of the artist's day, while  
 under his arm he carries a gun. It  
 was a common mistake for old ar-  
 tists to clothe their characters in  
 garb of their time, irrespective of  
 the date of the picture's story.

**Among the Swis.**  
 Switzerland has over 1,700 hotels.  
 During the last ten years there  
 were 10,924 requests for citizenship  
 in Switzerland, of which 7,833 were  
 granted.

A landslide occurred recently in  
 Switzerland. An inn and its garden  
 and outbuildings slide down a hill-  
 side a distance of 35 feet without  
 being in the least injured. Two  
 stately elm trees in the garden were  
 also moved without injury.

Switzerland is the oldest republic  
 on record, and has existed as such  
 surrounded by forms of government  
 entirely different. It has maintain-  
 ed its position not by extent of ter-  
 ritory, population or military pow-  
 er, but by the jealousy of the na-  
 tions surrounding it.
