Township Councils.

CHATHAM TOWNSHIP COUNCIL.

The regular meeting of the town-
ship of Chatham council was held at
the township hall on Monday, the 3rd
October, pursuant to adjournment,
and the notice to the Charlton drain
cut-off ratepayers in that behalf.
The members were all present and
the minutes of last meeting were
read and adopted and signed by the
reeve.

On motion the meeting was ad-
journed, and the court of revision on
the Charlton drain cut-off assess-
ment was proceeded with as a ma-
jority of the ratepayers on said
drain were present. The evidence
was heard and after considering the
same the following resolution was
passed:

Templeton—George, that the fol-
lowing changes be made in the en-
gineer's assessment for the construc-
tion of the Charlton drain cut-off—
that the n w q r lot 14, con. 9, be
transferred to the Charlton drain im-
provement, west of the cut-off;
that \$44.00 be reduced from the as-
sessment on the n e q r of lot 14, con.
9; that the n w q r of lot 15, con. 9,
be reduced \$20.00; that the s w q r
lot 17, con. 10, be reduced \$10.00;
and that the said reduction be placed pro
rata over the whole assessment as
thus amended, and the court of re-
vision be finally closed.—Carried.

The revision of the engineer's as-
sessment on the improvement of the
Charlton drain west of the cut-off
was the subject of the following re-
solutions:

The assessment was examined and
the evidence considered and the fol-
lowing resolution passed:

Templeton—George, that the en-
gineer's assessment for the improve-
ment of the Charlton drain be changed
as follows; that n e q r of the s
w q r of lot 14, con. 9, be reduced
\$10.00; that the s w q r of lot 15,
con. 10, be reduced \$50.00; that the
s e q r of lot 13, con. 9, be raised
\$10.00; and that the following lands
omitted by the engineer, be assessed;
the s e q r of lot 8, con. 10, \$10;
the s w q r of lot 13, con. 9, \$10;
the n w q r of lot 15, con. 9, \$10;
the n e q r of lot 17, con. 10, \$10.
The difference be placed over the whole
assessment on the lands and roads as
thus amended, and the court of re-
vision finally closed.—Carried.

General business was then taken
up. The reports of W. G. McGeorge,
C. E., on the repair of the 9th con-
drit and on the repair of the Everitt
Stephen drain were received and
read. On motion of Couns. Temple-
ton and George the said drainage
reports were adopted and the en-
gineer was authorized to make the
law to provide for the same pro-
visionally adopted and ordered to
be printed in the Dresden Times
newspaper, and the court of re-
vision on the engineer's assessment
be held at the township hall on the
7th day of November, 1904.

W. W. Merritt presented a writ-
ten notice to have the Everitt
Creek drain repaired.

A letter was read from the law
firm of Lewis and Richards stating
that they intended to proceed with
a legal action for damages for reason
of the seizure and sale of two
cattle for taxes on the s w q r of
lot 7, con. 12.

Abraham—Irwin, that as a com-
plaint has been made and a notice
has been received from W. W. Mer-
ritt and seven others that the Ever-
itt Creek drain is out of repair, the
clerk notify W. G. McGeorge, C.E.,
that he is hereby appointed to make
an examination and survey of the
said Everitt Creek drain and report
on the same with a view to its re-
pair.—Carried.

McGeorge—Abraham, that the com-
missioner of the 5th div. is empow-
ered to have a tree cut down that is
in a dangerous condition on the 5th con-
roadway at a salary of \$140.

Templeton—George, that the offer
made by Alonzo McLean re the set-
tlement for arrears of taxes against
s e q r of lot 12, 13, 14, 15, of Chatham,
and that the clerk notify the
county treasurer to withdraw the
said land from sale.—Carried.

Templeton—Abraham, that Couns.
George and Irwin are hereby ap-
pointed a committee to wait upon
the township of Camden council and
to arrange some drainage matter be-
tween both townships.—Carried.

Templeton—George, that as there
has been complaint received that
there are certain obstructions in the
Charlton drain that prevent a free flow
of water, the clerk notify the com-
missioner to have the said bars and
obstructions removed, and the cost
charged to the drain.—Carried.

Abraham—Irwin, that J. W. Brown
be appointed to collect the taxes for
the 1st div. at a salary of \$140.
That Wm. Vance be appointed to col-
lect the taxes for the 2nd div. for
1904 at a salary of \$150, and that the
clerk prepare a by-law confirming the
said appointments, to be read at
next meeting of council.—Carried.

Templeton—George, that H. Cum-
mings be appointed to let and superin-
tend the work of repairing the Char-
lton drain west of the cut-off, accord-
ing to the plans and specifications
of the engineer, and that Wm. Irwin
be appointed commissioner on the
Charlton drain construction.—Carried.

Resolutions were passed ordering
payment of the following accounts:

over Big Creek cut-off, \$60.10; D. C.
McDonald, grave for Pangburn, an
indigent, \$25.00; Geo. Craven, cut-
ting weeds and thistles along road-
way, \$5.00; Gilbert Hebert, burying
dead hog, \$1.00; W. G. McGeorge,
final inspection of Tupperville swing
bridge, \$6.00; W. G. McGeorge, sur-
vey and award Clyde ditch, \$16.00;
W. G. McGeorge, survey and award
Meredith ditch, \$27.00; W. G. Mc-
George, survey and report 9th con-
drit, \$17.50; W. G. McGeorge, sur-
vey and report Stephen drain, \$22-
50; Jas. Chapman, 2-3 value sheep
killed, \$6.00; Wm. Perrin, 2-3 value
sheep killed, \$16.00; A. Faubert, 2-3
value sheep killed, \$6.00; W. Weaver,
sheep inspector's fees, \$3.00; E. H.
Moir, goods for indigent, \$16.50.
Meeting adjourned.
