J. S. Woodworth was appointed commissioner in re alteration of road in Ward 12 Bishop Mt., to Stronach's Road.

J. A. Northrup was appointed commissioner on road from Clark Lane to Main St., of Canis, through lands of W. Kinsman Co. and A. M. Lockwood.

On motion of Councillor Taylor it was resolved that the report of Arch Foster, commissioner on Ormsby Mt. road, be received, proceedings confirmed, roads established and damages paid.

Chas. Meekins was appointed commissioner to open up new road from Norwood road to Shaw road in Ward 5, Councillor Morse stating that interested residents of the vicinity were willing to supply teams and labor with out charge.

Report of H. B. Wiler, commissioner to lay out road in Canaan, read and consideration deferred until January term.

Re petition of C. F. Eaton for rent road to dyke land, reported that Grand Pre dyke decline to make any arrangements. Mr. Eaton was heard by consent of council, and it was resolved that Jas. Leard, Clerk of Grand Pre dyke, be asked to report upon the matter at January term of Council.

The committee appointed to consider the claim of proprietors of new Canis dyke for dyking land belonging to the Municipality reported that in their opinion the claim was excessive and recommended that they be offered the land or 50 per cent of the sum claimed. On motion of Comr. Reid it was resolved that no action be taken until an assessment of such dyke had been legally made.
