POTATO PRODUCTS CO.

Hartland correspondent St.
John Globe:

The potato-crop, which is the staple crop of Carleton county, promises to be up to the average though not quite as good as last year. The acreage is about the same as last year. The warm, wet weather which has prevailed for some time is conducive to rust but so far there is no appearance of this. Should this develop it will seriously damage the crop, as all the planters do not the systematic Bordeaux spraying which insures safety. The potato growers have had two good years and a good crop with a good market this year will put all the horny-handed sons of toil of Carleton county in Pierce-Arrows, Cadillacs, etc. and the Chevrolets will be left for their city cousins. But potatoes will have to sell at a good price to produce a profit this year. At the time of the great slump in the market two years ago, when potatoes were sold for 30c. a barrel, they were produced at the cost of 60c. This year on account of the price of seed, fertilizer and labor, it will cost \$2 a barrel to grow potatoes. From this it may be seen that the life of a potato grower is not a flowery bed of ease. A market of \$1 would mean ruin to many, while the 1914-15 price would stagger the best of them. The latter however is not anticipated.

For even if the market should be as unsatisfactory as stated, then the Carleton county grower would be in a much better condition, owing to the enterprise of Hatfield & Scott, the leading buyers in the county, who have erected and equipped a plant at Woodstock to manufacture potato products. They have there a plant which can now handle 1,000 bushels a day and turn out evaporated potatoes. There is a fairly good demand for this, which this year has increased by the demand from the war zone. They have now a contract for 1,000,000 pounds a month with the Imperial Government. In addition to this they have under the same roof a plant for manufacturing and canning a soup mixture consisting of potatoes, turnips and any ingredient of soup. This

product finds a ready and ever increasing market. Last year they took at a good price all the turnips available in the county and did not have enough to supply the demand. The price paid was so attractive that the turnip acreage is very much larger than ever known before.

This summer they have fitted up a starch factory in the basement of their building in which they will use the unmarketable potatoes and if the price should get down to a paying basis potatoes can be turned into starch. The total potato crop of New Brunswick last year was 11,000,000 bushels. This year it will probably be somewhat larger. Yet if the three branches of this plant were to run full capacity it would make an appreciable difference in the amount of potatoes placed on the general market. The plant at present is not running, but will be opened as soon as the crop begins to move, and will employ 100 hands. It is equipped with every labor saving device known to the trade which includes an endless chain-bucket arrangement for lifting the potatoes from the car in the siding to the factory and a gravity shoot for carrying the factory product to the car. The head office of the company is in Hartland, presided over by H. H. Hatfield, a Carleton county boy, and looks after the buying end of the business. Mr. Scott, the other member of the firm, takes charge of the Montreal office and largely attends to the sale department. The Woodstock factory is merely a side line. Handling table and seed potatoes is their main business.

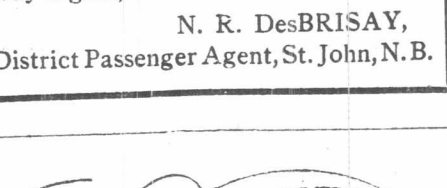

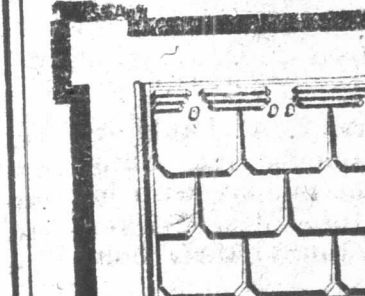
