WHAT BECOMES OF THE COTTON.—The New Orleans Times publishes a statement of the amount of cotton consumed by the principal countries of the world. Last year, Great Britain consumed 1,270,387,000 lbs.; Germany, 255,750,000 lbs.; France, 210,000,000; Russia, 150,000,000; Austria, 104,000,000; and Spain, 80,500,000. The United States consumed 674,888,000 lbs. England manufactures 43 per cent. of all cotton goods, the United States 23 per cent., the continental countries of Europe 38 per cent. England exports one-half of her manufactures, the United States only 7 per cent., which is not a very flattering credit for the enterprise and activity of her manufacturers. It is, however, attributed to some extent to the almost prohibitory tariff, with which many of the articles used in cotton manufacture are weighted down.

THE USE OF OZONE.—Ozone, the newest and the least staple of gases, has recently been made to go good service in the sick room. It makes short work with those miasmas and organic impurities of vitiated air which the Italians describe by the expressive name of malaria, and which every physician knows to be among the most baneful influences with which the convalescent patient, whose tenure of life is not yet quite secured, has to contend. A mixture should be made of permanganate of potash, peroxide of manganese and oxalic acid, in equal parts, and two large spoonfuls, with some water, put into a plate, and placed on the floor of the sick-chamber. Care should be taken, however, to remove the iron and steel utensils, since ozone will rust all metals madder than gold and silver.
