Mayo Fails to Settle The Suit of Miss Wahler

Action for Support of Her Child Goes Over a Week.

OTHER CASE TRIED LATER

Mayo in Court While the Woman Told Her Story.



MRS FLORENCE WEEKS MAYO

New Haven, March 29.—The writ of Miss Susanna E. M. Wahler's suit (13) against Virginia J. Mayo for support of her two-year-old daughter was heard before Justice of the Peace R. H. Land in Hampden today, and after an all-day, session adjournment was taken for a week. The opposing counsel had a fruitless conference lasting several hours, in an effort to effect a settlement out of court.

Mayo sat opposite the witness box in court and heard Miss Wahler's, his former typist, give her testimony. Until the disclosures following the death of Lillian May Cook by her own hand on West Rock March 4, Miss Wahler had kept the name of the father of her child from all but her family. Then she brought the suit heard in part today.

Mayo stood the three-hour recital of the morning without showing any feeling, but this afternoon at the beginning of the second session Prosecutor Woodruff for Miss Wahler's and Benjamin Slade for Mayo got together for a conference.

Today's suit has no connection with the \$150,000 damage suit brought by Miss Wahler against Mayo.

The courtroom was crowded this morning and Justice Land finally had to order out all except reporters, witnesses and lawyers. Mayo entered a denial of the charges and Miss Wahler was called. She was dressed in a blue suit, white shirtwaist and black hat with a green plume.

After the preliminary questions she said:

"The child was born on Jan. 25, 1913. After an occurrence in the private office of the Mayo Radiator Company plant in Hampden in April, 1912, I spoke to Mr. Mayo about it but he only laughed at me. I asked him to do something for me and he suggested that I go and see a doctor.

"Soon after Mr. Mayo left his office for a trip to Buffalo. He said he was going to see a doctor in Brooklyn about my case.

"Before he went he asked me to address an envelope to myself and he would communicate with me, but he didn't want any one else in the office to know he wrote me.

"The letter was written in evidence as an objection was entered by the defense.

"I received the letter in the mail later and there was this note in it. She handed Mr. Woodruff a note addressed from the Hotel Iroquois, Buffalo. This note said:

"I was not in, get some other one. Fix up the matter soon. Going to Detroit tonight. V. J. M."

"Mr. Mayo returned in a week," she said, "and gave me a blank prescription with the name of a Brooklyn doctor on it. He told me to take \$100 out of the cash drawer and to go to Brooklyn to the doctor. I did so on June 20, 1912. I went to the doctor, but he said he'd see me on Monday. However, I did not go. I went back and told my mother about it."

She said she spent only \$12.95 of the \$100 and gave back the rest. She said that Mayo promised her \$18 a week for two years if she would keep his name out of the case and that he would always take care of her.

At this point Prosecutor Woodruff had the child brought into the room by her grandfather and held a blotter under her eyes so that Justice Land could see the similarity between the child's eyes and forehead and those of Mayo.

The girl closed her direct testimony.

Borden Government Zealously Guards War Expenditures

Sir George Foster Declares that the Policy of the Government Has Been to Ostracise the Middleman and Deal Directly with the Manufacturer.

Ottawa, March 29.—As the curtain is being slowly lowered upon the parliamentary stage the outstanding impression left upon the unbiased observer's mind is that in its conduct of the war the Government has been unerringly guided by patriotic and national desires. In the various parliamentary committees, while a score of witnesses were refuting the advance verdicts of guilt, rendered by prejudiced and interested judges, the Commons heard from the lips of Sir George Foster the story of the efforts put forward by Sir Robert Borden to safeguard the public interest and the fair name of the Dominion.

The Minister of Trade and Commerce impressed his hearers when he told how the Prime Minister had issued a letter to the members of the cabinet urging them that they should deal, not with middlemen, but with the original sources of supply, and that when this was impossible they should first consult him; how in his own case his first question to all order seekers was: "What will do you represent?"

"If they did not represent a mill," added the minister, "I had no further dealings with them." For my own self, and I think I can speak for every member of the Government, I am jealous of any one ten cent piece which goes to any other objective than that which is authorized by this Parliament for the prosecution of this war."

The veteran parliamentarian's words, spoken with studied emphasis, drew sympathetic cheers from all sides of the House.

Only a few minutes later, Sir George, who was leading the House in the absence of the Prime Minister, earned loud applause from ministerial benches, when he declared, in answer to Mr. Oliver, that "Canada is in this war to see it through."

"If we need more money or more men, the Government stands ready to fill that need, knowing that in doing so it is characteristically Canadian."

The day did not pass without the angry rattle of verbal musketry. The militant member for St. John had some serious criticism to offer in regard to the purchase of supplies in the United States for the Governments of Great Britain and her Allies.

He said that it was stated in New York that owing to the operations of Mr. Allison, the price of ammunition had been advanced from \$25 to \$33 per thousand rounds, that this was made possible by credentials Mr. Allison had in his possession from the Minister of Militia describing him as the agent of the British and Canadian Government, and that things had occurred in this connection which made Canadians in New York blush for their country.

General Hughes replied to Mr. Pugsley of characteristically style. He maintained that it was impossible for the British or any other Government to obtain ammunition in the United States at the price quoted by Mr. Pugsley.

"I challenge contradiction from the world, and all the detective agencies in the universe," snapped the General. "The member for St. John talks of by saying that she had written asking Mayo to keep his promise of \$18 a week, but that she received no reply."

On cross-examination Miss Wahler said she succeeded Lois Waterbury as chief bookkeeper for Mayo.

She was asked if a Mr. Bond of New York had not suggested that she sue Mayo, and she said that he had not; that her family had advised her and that Mr. Bond had only told her that now was the proper time to sue if over.

SIR JOHN FRENCH'S GLOWING PRAISE

Declares He Has Never Seen a More Magnificent Battalion than Princess Pats.

Ottawa, March 29.—His Royal Highness the Governor-General today received a message from Field Marshal Sir John French, commending highly the work of the Canadian division. It reads as follows:

"Headquarters British Army, "March 3.

"Sir—The Canadian troops having arrived at the front, I am anxious to tell your Royal Highness that they have made the best impression on all of us.

"After two or three weeks preliminary education in the trenches, attached by unit to the Third Corps, they have now taken over their own line on the right of that corps—as a complete division—and I have the utmost confidence in their capability to do valuable and efficient service.

"The Princess Patricia's regiment arrived with the 27th division a month earlier, and since then they have performed splendidly in the trenches.

"When I inspected them—also in pouring rain—it seemed to me I had never seen a more magnificent looking battalion—guards or otherwise.

"Two or three days ago they captured a German trench with great dash and energy, and excellent results.

"I am writing these few lines because I know how deeply we are all indebted to the untiring and devoted efforts your Royal Highness has personally made to insure the despatch in the most efficient condition of this valuable contingent.

"I have the honor to be, Sir, "Your Royal Highness's devoted servant. (Signed) "J. D. P. FRENCH."

PREMIER BORDEN'S MOTHER IS DEAD

Sir Robert Reached Her Bed-side Before She Passed Away Yesterday.

Grand Pre, N. S., March 29.—Mrs. Borden, mother of Premier Borden, died at 3:10 this morning. Her sons, Sir Robert, J. W., and her daughter Julia, were at the bedside. Mrs. Borden would have been ninety-one had she lived to next December. Her father was John Laird, a man who left his mark for good on his generation. He was farmer, teacher, classical scholar, mathematician, and his daughter inherited in a marked degree his strong mental qualities, sterling character and courteous disposition. She was born in Grand Pre, as her father also was, and she will be laid to rest in the old churchyard, mourned by the whole countryside. Her distinguished son and bereaved family will have the sympathy of the whole Dominion.
