DEFALCATIONS OF \$1,105,000.

PITTSBURGH HAS A GREAT FINANCIAL SCANDAL.

And a Large Number of Prominent Men Are Said to be Likely to be Drawn Into It.

Pittsburgh, Pa., April 1.—Two new informations have been filed against Henry Reiber, formerly paying teller, and John Young, formerly auditor, by National Bank Examiner William L. Folds, charging them with embezzling \$1,105,000 of the funds of the Farmers' Deposit National Bank and with making and causing to be made in the latter's statement book false entries to conceal the defalcation, with intent to embezzle and defraud.

An official statement issued by the bank, signed by T. H. Given, president, is as follows: At a special meeting of the board of directors held at the banking house corner Fifth avenue and Wood street, at 10:30 a. m., it was resolved that the actual amount of the defalcation of the paying teller and auditor having been definitely ascertained to be \$1,105,000, this amount was ordered to be charged off at once out of the surplus and other undivided profits of \$2,863,000, leaving the capital \$6,000,000 and the surplus and other undivided profits \$1,758,000.

The bill is assessed as follows: \$25,000 each on the first charge of embezzling \$85,000; \$75,000 each on the charge of conspiring with Harry Silverman, the broker, the latter's bail in that case being fixed at \$15,000; \$75,000 each on the charge of embezzlement charged yesterday, and \$75,000 on the charge of making false entries.

When the writ of Young, one of the prisoners was admitted to see him in his cell a very pathetic scene followed. Young said: "There, Minnie, this affair has got beyond the stage where tears can help. You have done no wrong and you must not suffer for me. Now what I want you to do, Minnie, is to forget that you ever knew me. If you cannot do that just now, think of me as though I were dead. It will help you if you never see me again, so you must not come here again for your own sake. So far as this wife and friends are concerned, John Young is dead! Good-by."

SIN AND DEATH.

Results of a Tragedy in Philadelphia Last Sunday Night.

Philadelphia, March 31.—Mrs. Ella Paschall, the second of the three women whom George E. Eels, a policeman, shot on Sunday while in a jealous rage, died today. SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST Homestead Regulations

ANY even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba or the Northwest Provinces, excepting 8 and 28 not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person the sole head of a family, or male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres more or less. Application for homestead entry must be made in person by the applicant at a Dominion Land Office or Sub-Agent's Office by proxy may, however, be made at an Agency on certain conditions. Entry by another person, daughter, brother or sister of an intending homesteader. Application for entry or cancellation of the application may be made by the homesteader or his Sub-Agent's Office may be wired to the Agent by the Sub-Agent. The expense of the application if the land applied for is vacant on receipt of the telegram such application is to have priority and the land will be held until the necessary papers to complete the transaction are received by mail. In case of "pre-emption" or fraud the applicant will forfeit all priority of claim if entry has been granted it will be assumed to be cancelled. An application for cancellation must be made in person. The applicant is not eligible for homestead entry, and only one application for cancellation will be received from an applicant. If a homesteader has been disposed of. Where an entry is cancelled subsequent to issuance of cancellation proceedings, the right of entry. Applicant for cancellation must state in what particular the homesteader is in default. A homesteader whose entry is not the subject of cancellation proceedings, may, at the approval of the Department, transfer his land in favour of father, mother, son, daughter or brother, if eligible, but to no one else, on filing declaration of abandonment. QUARTEES—A settler is required to perform the duties under one of the following heads: (1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year during the term of three years. (2) A homesteader may, if he so desires, perform the required residence in place on the farming land owned solely by him. Not less than eight (8) months must elapse in the vicinity of his homestead. Joint or several entry will not meet this requirement. (3) If the settler is unable to perform the duties in the vicinity of the homestead, or upon a homestead entered for him in the vicinity, such homesteader may perform his residence duties by living with the father (or mother).

TO WORK ON PANAMA CANAL

Hindus at Vancouver Turn Eyes on the Isthmus.

Vancouver, March 31.—Having been coldly received by their fellow-citizens of the Canadas, and having been ruthlessly driven from their jobs in the United States, the Hindus in this city, who have been without work for several months, look with hoping eyes upon Panama as a place where they will be received on an equality as far as their labor is concerned, with other workers. The leaders of the Hindus have been investigating the situation in Panama. Several of the number went to the Isthmus about ten weeks ago, and they report that the Hindus can obtain plenty of employment at good wages. Efforts are now being made by the Hindus to get transportation for the crowd numbering 1,000. Thus far they have been unsuccessful, but as there are several large vessels due to leave for the Isthmus from this port and Puget Sound within the fortnight, it is likely they can get away very soon.

London Stock Broker Missing.

London, Ont., March 31.—H. E. Kendall, a stock broker, who came here from Petrolia and occupied an office in the Masonic Temple, has left the city, and Mr. J. P. Evans, proprietor of the Grigg House, to whom he is indebted, has placed the matter in the hands of his attorneys. Kendall is said to be in Detroit.
