Setting Bees on Tax Collectors.—A reluctant taxpayer in Arkansas, named Rollston, being set upon by two collectors who came to distraint upon his household effects, politely invited them to go ahead in their own way, and then stepped out of doors. Stanley.—The fame of the *Herald* explorer was no sooner spread abroad by the report of his success than people began to ask who is Stanley? Various answers have been given, the only well authenticated one being that he was the *Herald's* correspondent with General Napier in Abyssinia. Our Scotch correspondent became acquainted with him in Egypt, and formed a high opinion of him. One English newspaper asserted that his name was John Thomas, and his mother an English woman in humble life. A western paper says he used to be a consummate fabricator of bogus correspondence for the *Omaha Bee*. And now the *New York Sun* has a three column sensational account of Mr. Stanley's career previous to his becoming an attaché of the *Herald*. This account is of the customary circumstantial character, signed and vouched for as authentic, and professing to be supported by documentary evidence in possession of the writer. According to this Mr. Stanley's career has been that of an adventurous forger and a swindler. Although there seems to be no doubt of the authenticity of the Livingstone letters in England, doubt is still entertained in France of their genuineness. Taking everything into consideration, it is to be regretted that the Royal Geographical Society's expedition under Lieut. Dawson failed to get further than the Zanzibar. The success of the Stanley expedition is one of the reasons which are assigned for its not having proceeded further.

A Lady Friend of Doctor Johnson once asked him for his candid opinion of a work she had just written, but not yet committed to press, and begged him to tell her if he thought it would not succeed, as she had other irons in the fire, to take its place if it seemed likely to fail.

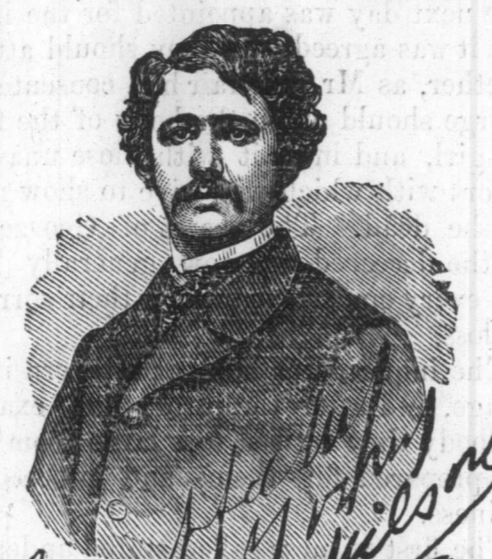
