The advance of the Germans across the French frontier towards Paris consumed weeks, was laborious ly prosecuted, and was maintained, day after day, and week after week in the face of a series of aggressive defensive movements, which decimat-

The reassuring feature of the situa

ed the ranks of the invaders at an appalling rate. After having forged their way at such deadly cost, almost to the gates of Paris, the German forces are now suffering even heavier losses in a recrograde movement east ward from the French capital toward the frontiers whence they emerged weeks ago. The net result of the German operations of almost a month has been a conspicuous weakening of their forces. Their casualties have been enormous-out of all proportion scuttled for the Dardanelles.
