eath he was busy with his facile en, which, during his lifetime turned out more than two hur dred dramas and playlets. Next to Lope de Vega Calderon wa Spain's greatest dramatist and the most typically national Spanish writer of the century.

Calderon was born in 1600 Madrid, of Austrian stock, his family having come from the north districts. His first play was written at the age of thirteen, CHARLOTTETOWN and at twenty-two he took part in a poetical contest in honor of St. Isadore in Madrid and won a prize with a poem that elicited great praise from De Vega.

> He was educated at the Un versity of Salamanca, and early in his career assumed the man agement of the Theatre de Bue Retiro, where many of his plays were produced. He was a great favorite with the reigning mon arch, Philip IV, and he worked with untiring energy turning out productions to please his king and the populace.

Many of his plays were "auto sacramentales" or sacred allegor ical dramas on the Holy Euchar ist, and it is in productions of this character that some critics say he excelled. They closely remiddle ages, and in their dramatized form were usually intended for exposition on the Feast of Corpus Christi.

eye in reading of old Catholic century ago there was only one times is the word "rood." It is word which introduces the student to a variety of interesting customs and works of Christian art, says the Pilot.

The Anglo-Saxon word "rod or " rode " meant " cross." The word "rood" was often employed to signify the True Cross itself This, with the prefix "holy," occurs at the dedication of some hurches. One of the best known examples, perhaps, is "Holyrood Abbey " in Scotland.

But the usual significance the term is one which refers to a striking architectural or artistic feature of some mediaeval churches. The word generally referred to a large crucifix, with statues of the Blessed Virgin the Hierarchy in that country is Mary and St. John, which was usually placed over the entrance bishops, 14 Bishops, and 1,600. to the "choir" part in mediaeval 000 Cathelies.

which were kept burning before the rood itself, were another con picuous sight in the churches hese consisted sometimes of wick and oil in a crease or rood bow sometimes of a taper on a pricket n the center of a mortar of brass, attern or copper.

The artistic and devotiona gnificance of these features of hurch contents throws an inter esting light on one phase o Christian art in olden times. The rood was an impressive object, and its position in a conspicuous place could easily serve to keep the beholder mindful of the events which it recalled.
