Benn Miller.

About six miles from Goderich and four miles from Smith's Hill, on the Division Line between East and West Colborne, is situated the flourishing village of Benn Miller. The place is called after its founder, Ben Miller, who built a saw mill there in 1832. It is now a place of about 100 inhabitants, with a most picturesque location and a magnificent water power. A very fine stone truss bridge spans the Maitland river at this point. The following will give an idea of the business of the place: There is one hotel in the village, kept by Mr. Jonathan Miller, whose appearance is sufficient to give a good name to any house, and shows that good cheer can be found by all anxious to obtain it; Mr. Miller also carries the mails twice a week between Goderich and Benn Miller, and in addition superintends the post-office at this point; there are two stores, kept by Mr. Miller and W. Robertson; one shoe shop, Wm. Moss; two carpenter shops, Andrew Hill and James Walters; two blacksmiths, John Durst and W. Robertson; an excellent flouring mill with three run of stones, W. Luker; one woollen mill doing a good business, Jesse Gladhill; one tannery, Godfrey Vade; two lime kilns, Thos. Good and Geo. Forby; one tailor, Frederick Larmie; a nursery and strawberry plantation by John Stewart, and a cheese factory. There is one church in the village, the Methodist Episcopal, under the ministrations of Rev. W. N. Vollock. The school house of S. S. No. 2 is located at this point, presided over by Mr. P. Cantelon. The trustees are Messrs. Nicholas Vorrish, James Jenkins and John Swan. A special meeting of ratepayers was held on the 4th inst. to consider the advisability of removing the school house, when it was decided by a majority of 21 not to remove it, but to erect a new frame edifice next year. One of the most important of our township officials also resides here, in the person of Mr. William Vanstone, the tax collector, who provides the sinews of war for the successful carrying on of the government of the township of Colborne.

Fort Albert.

The Post Office authorities have seen fit to make a change in the mail service on this route, much to the detriment of business men and others, who use the Post Office freely and want prompt mail delivery. For years the stages carrying the mails to this place, left Goderich and Kincardine on the arrival of the afternoon mail trains from the east. The stages meet at Kintail, exchanged mails and passengers, and returned to Goderich and Kincardine respectively; thus delivering the mails from the east to the public on this route the same evening. But now it seems through indifference to the wants of the people, or through some other cause perhaps worse than indifference, the people here may wait until the next day for their mail matter, as the stages are not to leave Goderich and Kincardine until the next morning, going out to Kintail in the morning, and returning to Goderich and Kincardine in the evening; and judging by the time they make at present, it will be near mid-day when they reach this place; thus practically keeping our mails a day behind time, and giving us the same time to go to the Post Office in the middle of the day. Now the department could have made a change, suitable to all parties, if they had been guided by common sense, or if they wished to make the Post Office what it was originally intended for—a convenience to the people. By starting from Kintail in the morning instead of Goderich, they could return from Goderich and Kincardine in the evening as usual; thus avoiding the night work complained of. Why they have allowed this change seems a mystery, unless the interests of the public are not intended to stand in the way of the wishes of a few individuals.
