SCHOOL BOARD.

Trustees met last Monday evening. All the members present, except Mr. Buchanan, whose illness will account for his absence.

Principal's monthly report, read. Stated 227 on roll, average attendance 271, per centum 77. Adopted.

ACCOUNTS.

G. H. Parsons, \$4.06; E. Armstrong, \$3.50; Geo. Sheppard, \$19.32; W. Mitchell, \$3.05; J. Emerston, 75c-were referred to Finance Committee.

On motion of Messrs. Swanson and Nicholson, if found correct, to be paid.

Mr. Megaw afterward certified to above accounts being correct, and they were ordered to be paid.

Tenders for examination papers (1,000 ten forms) were read from Strickland, the News and Star; The Signal, being lowest, was awarded the work.

MODEL SCHOOLS.

By Order in Council, new regulations are issued respecting these schools. The board is required to furnish an extra teacher during the two sessions of four months in each year. An extra room has also to be provided for Model School purposes. It is further ordered that the Master of the Model School shall have a first-class certificate. It is further provided that the Government grant shall be \$150 per annum, and the County Council are to furnish a like sum.

Considerable discussion ensued as to whether it would be advisable to incur the extra expense or do away with the Model School.

Mr. Nicholson said that the present library room would meet the requirements of the case; and if the Master continued to receive only his present remuneration, and if the Department would permit his doing the work as heretofore without additional help, the Board would be \$100 gained.

As there was no necessity for immediate action, the matter was referred to a committee consisting of Crab Nicholson, Megaw and Cooke.

NOMINATIONS AND ELECTIONS.

Moved by Mr. Cooke, seconded by Mr. Pasmore that all nominations for Trustees for 1882 take place in the Central School, and that St. Andrew's, St. David's and St. Patrick's ward schools and E. Gordon's shop be the places for holding elections, in the wards for which a poll is demanded. Carried.

Mr. Pasmore was appointed returning officer for nomination day. Moved by Mr. Pasmore, seconded by Mr. Nicholson that for election purposes John Stevens be returning officer for St. Andrew's ward, S. Yates for St. Patrick's, J. Addison for St. David's, J. Gordon for St. George's. Carried.

The remuneration for nomination officers, and \$3 each for election returning officers.

Applications of Miss Watson, Miss Ralph and Miss Henderson for positions as teachers, were read. Mrs. Watson was appointed the Central; Miss Ralph to St. David's, Miss Henderson to St. Andrew's. Miss Cassidy will remain in her present position; Miss Sleight will continue to act for Miss Harries.

Moved by Mr. Swanson, seconded by Mr. Cooke, that the places advertised for to take the places vacated by Miss Sleight and Miss Drummond be retained.

The Board adjourned.

Marine News.

WILSON, Dec. 4. The tug Tommy Wright returned here this evening from an unsuccessful search after the missing steamer Jane Miller, having on board four lifeboats, three coars, some pins out of the life boat of the steamer, and the paid rock all indicated as having belonged to the Jane Miller; also some kegs of butter with Capt. Port's brand on them. It is thought she has gone down near Colpoys Bay, not a mile from the shore, with all hands. Capt. Port's family is highly distressed. He leaves a widow and a grown up family. Christian, the engineer, also leaves a family. The Jane Miller was consequently a new steamer, this being only her third career. She was not considered a safe boat, owing to being too heavy when heavily laden. As far as can be learned the following were on board: Andrew Port, Captain; J. Christian, Engineer; Richard Port, Mate; Fred Port, Purser; Alex. Sade, Wheelwright, and four deck hands, names unknown, all from this vicinity. Passengers: Jas. Walker, Jas. Hallock and Lyman Vaider, and man and wife, all from Meaford, bound for Michael's Bay, and a number of passengers from Owen Sound for Lynn Head whose names are not known.

High Prices Makes Hard Times.

The members of the Civil Service in Ontario are agitating for an advance of salaries, on the supposition that the Government does not intend to give them the increase for this claim is the alleged increased cost of living. One would fancy that the official had had a calculation of the effect of such a declaration in the presence of the leader of the Government, who was elected prior to the last election in expressing his great anxiety to get the poor man a cheap breakfast table. In a polite way those whose opinions as it were, largely depend upon the favor and bounty of the Government, have told Sir John Macdonald that he has failed to fulfil his promise, that the contrary his blessed N. P. has established monopolies by which some more expensive, while they have not received a corresponding addition to their personal requirements.

The News is professedly an independent paper, but is really a Tory paper in disguise. It is printed in a Conservative office, is owned by Conservatives, is edited by Conservatives, and is run in the interests of the Conservative party as an "independent" paper.

Mrs. Williams occupied the chair. The need for woman's help in the battle against intemperance was very nicely put before the meeting by the speaker.

MISSIONARY MEETINGS-The Mission services at Helmsville on Monday evening were excellent. They were largely attended, and were very successful. The Rev. Dr. Williams, of Goderich, preached on Sunday, and in company with the Revs. L. O. Rice and A. Hill, addressed the meeting on the evening of January 7th.

While in St. Thomas last week, Rev. Dr. Williams was tendered a social reception by the Ladies' All-Society of the First Methodist Church. About 250 sat down to refreshments, after which the "guest of the evening" took his friends with him in a "trip to England." The Ladies' Journal gives an extended report of the lecture, which is freely interspersed with "laughter" and "applause."

"NOVELS, NOVELISTS" &c.-Dr. Williams' lecture on this subject on Monday evening was analytical, lucid, and forcible. In a masterly way, worthy of so gifted a minister, each author and his works were set forth boldly according to merits and demerits, guarding Schools and all sorts against a weak, senseless class of literature while at the same time pointing to some novels &c. places among the forces of literary and social progress. MODEL SCHOOLS.

By Order in Council, new regulations are issued respecting these schools. The board is required to furnish an extra teacher during the two sessions of four months in each year. An extra room has also to be provided for Model School purposes. It is further ordered that the Master of the Model School shall have a first-class certificate. It is further provided that the Government grant shall be \$150 per annum, and the County Council are to furnish a like sum.

Considerable discussion ensued as to whether it would be advisable to incur the extra expense or do away with the Model School.

Mr. Nicholson said that the present library room would meet the requirements of the case; and if the Master continued to receive only his present remuneration, and if the Department would permit his doing the work as heretofore without additional help, the Board would be \$100 gained.

As there was no necessity for immediate action, the matter was referred to a committee consisting of Crab Nicholson, Megaw and Cooke.

NOMINATIONS AND ELECTIONS.

Moved by Mr. Cooke, seconded by Mr. Pasmore that all nominations for Trustees for 1882 take place in the Central School, and that St. Andrew's, St. David's and St. Patrick's ward schools and E. Gordon's shop be the places for holding elections, in the wards for which a poll is demanded. Carried.

Mr. Pasmore was appointed returning officer for nomination day. Moved by Mr. Pasmore, seconded by Mr. Nicholson that for election purposes John Stevens be returning officer for St. Andrew's ward, S. Yates for St. Patrick's, J. Addison for St. David's, J. Gordon for St. George's. Carried.

The remuneration for nomination officers, and \$3 each for election returning officers.

Applications of Miss Watson, Miss Ralph and Miss Henderson for positions as teachers, were read. Mrs. Watson was appointed the Central; Miss Ralph to St. David's, Miss Henderson to St. Andrew's. Miss Cassidy will remain in her present position; Miss Sleight will continue to act for Miss Harries.

Moved by Mr. Swanson, seconded by Mr. Cooke, that the places advertised for to take the places vacated by Miss Sleight and Miss Drummond be retained.

The Board adjourned.

Marine News.

WILSON, Dec. 4. The tug Tommy Wright returned here this evening from an unsuccessful search after the missing steamer Jane Miller, having on board four lifeboats, three coars, some pins out of the life boat of the steamer, and the paid rock all indicated as having belonged to the Jane Miller; also some kegs of butter with Capt. Port's brand on them. It is thought she has gone down near Colpoys Bay, not a mile from the shore, with all hands. Capt. Port's family is highly distressed. He leaves a widow and a grown up family. Christian, the engineer, also leaves a family. The Jane Miller was consequently a new steamer, this being only her third career. She was not considered a safe boat, owing to being too heavy when heavily laden. As far as can be learned the following were on board: Andrew Port, Captain; J. Christian, Engineer; Richard Port, Mate; Fred Port, Purser; Alex. Sade, Wheelwright, and four deck hands, names unknown, all from this vicinity. Passengers: Jas. Walker, Jas. Hallock and Lyman Vaider, and man and wife, all from Meaford, bound for Michael's Bay, and a number of passengers from Owen Sound for Lynn Head whose names are not known.

High Prices Makes Hard Times.

The members of the Civil Service in Ontario are agitating for an advance of salaries, on the supposition that the Government does not intend to give them the increase for this claim is the alleged increased cost of living. One would fancy that the official had had a calculation of the effect of such a declaration in the presence of the leader of the Government, who was elected prior to the last election in expressing his great anxiety to get the poor man a cheap breakfast table. In a polite way those whose opinions as it were, largely depend upon the favor and bounty of the Government, have told Sir John Macdonald that he has failed to fulfil his promise, that the contrary his blessed N. P. has established monopolies by which some more expensive, while they have not received a corresponding addition to their personal requirements.
