CHAPTER XXVII.—THE IRISH HEROINES.
CLOSING SUMMARY.

We have told these stories because there is so much in them that borders on human nature, and history reveals to us the character of those who pioneered our country. In the "Old Englishman" we had the lad who came as a son of industry; in the "Irish Emigrants" we had those who came for the same purpose; in the "Lad from Sunny France" we had a young man who was able to make his way; while in the "Soldier Lad" we had an equally desirable phase of life. In the good Doctor we found a man who, when he could not make a living by his regular calling, took the next best thing that came to hand and made a success of it. In our heroines and their good husbands we have those who represent capital and wealth; and who embarked on the uncertainty of business. In the company, therefore, we have a fair representation of the class of persons whom it takes to make a community; and upon whom the real success of a country rests. These men and women brought their best and gave it to their new homes; and though much has been written of Newfoundland's past her real domestic history has not been written; and it is the annals of the domestic, and the struggles of the individual, that many of our most interesting records lie.

In my ramblings round our Island home, I have learned much of these things, and it is because of this that I write in this manner. We have many in our midst who are well versed in our domestic history; and who, if they would give their views to the public, would contribute to our literature a vast amount of knowledge that is now being lost. We are being removed and estranged from the generation of our grandfathers; and our great grandfathers, some of whom I have written about, it was while travelling on the West Coast that my interest in these things was particularly aroused; and while reading the stories of our fellow-townsmen, Mr. Kinsella, of the Post Office, I began to think how much there is that we have yet to learn; and how much there is not written, and not recorded. Mr. Kinsella has told some rare stories in our Christmas numbers; and he told them just as he found them; and he found them as I have found these, by simply touching the freeds and hearts of the people. Though I have overstepped the number of chapters stated in opening these notes, I have not exhausted my list of stories, and perhaps at another date I will publish a few more. Each story as published has elicited comments and questionings from different people. I have met some who knew the old Englishman; and a few who knew the Irish Emigrants;

and in the story of Dr. Walsh, I discovered that my neighbor, Mr. Ben- dwin Bugden, who lives in the ad- joining property to mine, is a great grandson of the Doctor's. He called and told me that he had been follow- ing my notes, and that I had cleared up for him what had always been a title mystery. It was in reference to the table. He had often seen the table when a lad at Burin. There was something about it very uncommon that attract- ed his attention and the attention of others; but he never could find its proper history. He knew that it had been used by a surgeon who had served on a man-of-war, and that was about all the average person of the place knew about it. The table is still in the possession of the lady whom I have mentioned. She brought it to St. John's with her some twenty years ago when she came here to live. She did not like the city and returned to Burin; from whence she went to Halifax, where she now re- sides.

The table is mahogany as I stated, and is round, of about three feet diameter. It is bound round the edge with a rim that is about an eighth of an inch higher than the surface of the table proper. Mr. Bugden left Burin some twelve years ago, and went to Australia. He lived there even and a half years, and returned here to St. John's for the good of his wife's health. He thought it a little singular that he should have seen the table so often, and have travelled so far, and come back and learned the story of it from his neighbor. In closing our notes and stories for the present, we desire to thank all who have given encouragement either by kindly words or by expressions of approval. There are some few perhaps who misinterpreted the motive of writing; but the majority of readers, I feel certain, understand them, and read them in the spirit in which they are written. They are written for the common good of our common country; written to increase faith in her possibilities; and with a desire to show it possible that we have a heritage in Newfoundland that should be prized and developed; and if we are able to do this we must learn her history; and to learn her history we should study well the works of such authors as Prowse, Harvey and others; and thereby acquaint ourselves with their researches. To those who have read these pieces, and followed the stories through, whether at home or abroad; and in the realm of our own ramblings and sent us kindly words; to one and all, whether their home be in the city or in the village—for another term we say ADIEU.
