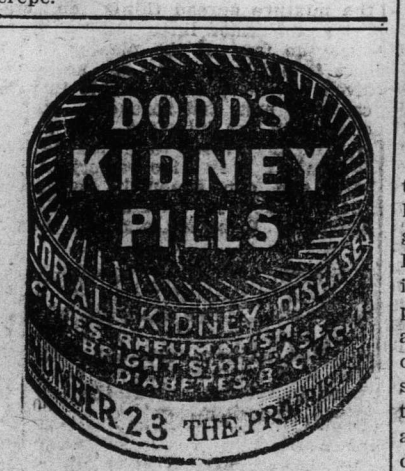
## GERMANY NOW TRYING TO ROUSE FEELING IN SPAIN.
