The Fag-End Opposition

Dear Sir,—It is really amusing to watch the efforts of our friends of the Opposition in their endeavors to galvanize into movement the body of their party which is in a state of suspended animation. What an insult to the Old Liberal Party which so often marched to victory under the great chieftains Sir William Whiteway, Sir Robert Bond, R. J. Kent, Sir Joseph Little, Honourable A. W. Harvey and the other patriotic gentlemen, who for so many years, successfully guided the destiny of Newfoundland in its uninterrupted march of Progress. And now a coterie of political cobblerers have arrogated to themselves the title of defenders of liberalism. Was there ever such an exhibition of presumption and impudence? They watch events as closely and as keenly to-day as they did in the days when they marched forward under the banner of Progress, led by their patriotic chiefs whose memory they cherish to-day. Mining Activities.

At Little Bay mining activities continue, though during July they were somewhat hampered through the shortage of coal. A tunnel is being driven from the Right towards the old mine. They have gone about two-thirds of the way, and we understand expect to reach the old workings before next spring. After which new shafts will be sunk.
At Gull Pond large bodies of ore have been located, of a very satisfactory quality, and prospects are bright for the future of that property. A road is to be built to the bottom of Hall's Bay, a distance of fourteen miles. The mine is located just half way between Hall's Bay and Millertown Junction.
Capt. D. McGuish, who had been visiting his home in Cape Breton, returned a few days ago and is again vigorously conducting coal mining operations at Howley. Coal of a first grade quality is being taken from the workings there, and the A. N. D. Co. are sparing no effort to ascertain the quantity of black diamonds available in that locality.
We learn that an option has been taken on an iron property on this coast, and prospecting operations are now in progress.—Western Star.


