

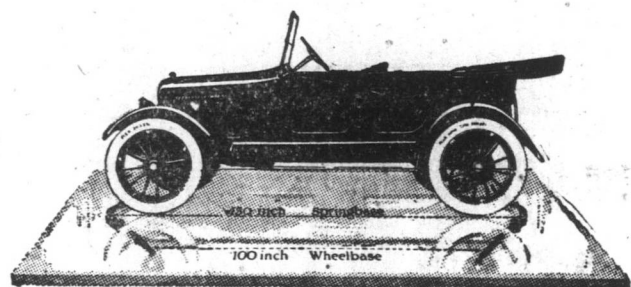

OBLIGED TO PUT BACK TO HALL-FAX.

It is expected that the American steamer Bassan will finish discharging her cargo of hard coal by to-morrow evening or Thursday morning. An ocean going tug left Boston last week for here to tow the Bassan to New York, but unfortunately she met with the loss of a propeller blade and was forced to put into Halifax for repairs. Another ocean going tug has now been ordered, and will be leaving Boston for this port within the next few days.

Snow Drifts.

BLOCK COUNTRY ROADS. Although the weather in the city yesterday was fairly good, yet out in the country a "blinding ground-drift" prevailed. Nearly all the country roads are blocked and the few people with horses who came to town yesterday had to break through fields. Getting home last evening was a terrible experience and two men on the Long Pond Road came near losing their horses. In one instance the horse had to be shovelled out and the carman and harness left behind, the horse being allowed to beat his own way home. Drifts at ten and twelve feet deep are not uncommon. Dwyer's Hill on the Carpasian Road is completely blocked the snow forming in a bank, presenting a wall on one side that would be difficult for a pedestrian to climb. On the Pennywell Road, the snow piled up in one place, where the thoroughfare was being widened, and shaped itself to a resemblance of the Rock of Gibraltar.
