At the Casino.

"EAST IS WEST" AN ENTRANCING
COMEDY DRAMA.

"East is West", produced last night by the Casino Stock Company, made such a favorable impression that a crowded house may be expected to follow for the rest of the week. Gorgeous Oriental and Western costumes, lighting and scenic effects never before seen in a local theatre, combined with faultless acting, were features of the show. Miss Amy Dennis captivated the audience by her exceptionally clever impersonation of a difficult role. Miss Dennis is without doubt a star. She can put, give a roguish smile or give a shake of her head that is irresistible. Miss Lottie Lee is also a great favorite. In Adam and Eva, she had a nice part as Corithia, but last night as the vivacious fiancee, Mildred Benson, she was seen to wonderful advantage in a variety of gorgeous costumes. In the male characters, Mr. Fred Allen, as Charles Yang was exceptionally fine, and although his role was rather of a disagreeable nature, repeated applause greeted his acting. Mr. Hal Shaughnessy took two totally different parts. His acting in both were faultless. As Chang Lee he was a study, and as Thomas, a butler, he brought down the house by his mannerism. In the important role of Lo Sang Kee, Mr. Charles Dingle excelled, he is undoubtedly a master actor, with perfect elocution. Mr. Frank Harvey, as proprietor of the Love Boat was particularly good. East is West is a comedy drama, having an intensely interesting story. The first scene a Love Boat on the Yang Ise River, China, depicts where Chinese women are bought and sold. The stage settings are specially designed for the part. It is in the Love Boat that Ming Toy (Amy Dennis) makes her first appearance, being brought there by her Chinese father, Hop Toy to be sold with other women. She next appears in a palatial Chinese home in San Francisco. The settings and lighting effects for this act are marvelously accurate and one can find nothing overlooked. In the second act Ming Toy is again sold to a wealthy restaurant keeper, but she manages to be installed as a maid in an American home. An intensely thrilling love story then develops and up till the final chapter there are moments when the audience is held spellbound. The whole play is exceptionally good, and is notable for the deft manner in which the tragic scene are lighted by comedy. There is no doubt that for the rest of the week East is West will attract large audiences.

Newfoundland Poultry Association.

April meeting was held last night in the Board of Trade Building and there was a good attendance. Messrs. Ern Warren and Stephen Emberly submitted splendid samples of sprouted oats for poultry feed, and were congratulated on their products. The Association is desirous of encouraging the growing of local grain for poultry feed and prizes have been offered by the Minister of Agriculture who was approached by the N.P.A. for the best oat and half bushel of the following grains of this year's crop:—Oats, wheat, barley and rye. The Rev. A. Pittman, rector of Topsail, at last year's exhibition showed splendid samples of headless barley, wheat and sweet corn which showed what can be done in this direction. Capt. Goodfellow, M.C., Private Secretary to his Excellency the Governor was elected to membership last evening. Judge Walter Clayton of the N.P.A. has kindly offered to give the members at the May meeting the plans of a new model poultry house for cold climate which has been recently approved of by the leading authorities in Canada. The Association will advertise next month the names of all breeders who have hatching eggs for sale. This spring a large number of folk than usual are going to raise chickens, as feeds are lower and fresh eggs are in larger demand than ever and are sold readily at one dollar a dozen; the demand being greater than the supply. The Association will soon start their lectures on Poultry Culture to nearby outports and the city suburbs in order to stimulate increased interest in the raising of more and better poultry.

That Tory Kiss to Squires

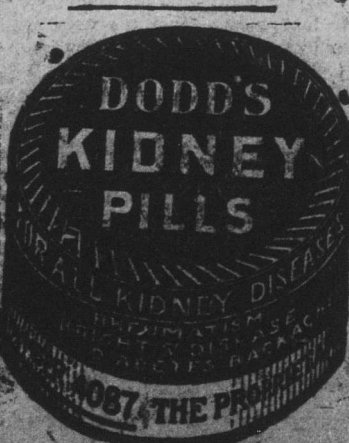
Editor Evening Telegram

Magistrate's Court.

A 80 year old stoker, residing on Hamilton Street, appeared on a charge of being drunk and disorderly. He paid a fine of \$2.00.

At 2 o'clock this morning an engineer from the S. S. Capto, now undergoing repairs at the dry dock, created a disturbance on Water St. having threatened to clean out the whole police force. Consts. Henderson and Kenny, who were doing their best along that thoroughfare at the time, challenged their man, and although he was a big burly chap, the officers found no difficulty in placing him under arrest. In court this morning a fine of \$2.00 or 7 days was imposed.

Four boys, ranging from ten to fourteen years of age, appeared in the Juvenile Court for the larceny of \$4.50 in cash, 4 pipes, 2 ties, 1 stick pin to the value of \$6.00 the property of T. J. Barron & Co. Secondly, the charge of stealing \$1.50 in cash from the West End store of the St. John's Meat Co. The youths, with the exception of one had confessed their guilt. The ring leader was sentenced to five lashes of the birch, a second received three lashes, while the other two were allowed to go under suspended sentence.

Price of Fat Increased.

SPIRIT OF HARMONY TELLS.

Those who for political reasons are raising the cry: "Down with the Merchants," are not in any way helping the fishermen, and the latter are beginning to realize that a state of harmony is more to their interest than one of antagonism. This was clearly demonstrated in the recent negotiations over the price of fat. Through the adoption of a conciliatory policy the price of fat is increased \$10 per ton more to the sealers. The honor of getting this advance for the men belongs to Capt. Jesse Winsor, Mr. Sidney Hill, and a number of delegates from S.S. Eagle. When the Sagona arrived in port an official of the F.P.U. made arrangements to sell the fat at \$4.55, and on this basis the crew were paid. Yesterday the United Fishermen's Delegation interested themselves in the men's share of the Eagle's catch. They visited various firms and arranged to sell the fat at an increase of 25 cents per quintal. The seals have been purchased by Messrs. Baine Johnston & Co. and will be taken to Harbor Grace for manufacture. "The price is what Coaker makes it" is a bubble that has burst.

AT ST. MARY'S HALL TO-NIGHT.

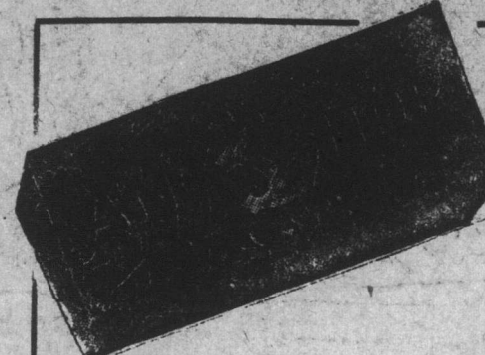
