

West Peterboro.

The Globe of to-day contains copies of telegrams which passed between Sir John A. Macdonald and Mr. Cluxton, the defeated candidate at the West Peterboro' election, which have been brought to light by the Commission appointed in accordance with the resolutions of the Election Committee, on the application of Mr. Cluxton. They prove conclusively that Sir John had no doubt of the result of Mr. Cluxton's election, but he did not wish to advise Mr. Cluxton, though requested to do so; and he had no doubts about treating Mr. Cluxton's interference as perfectly upright and natural. It is further proved that the returning officer's partial action was caused by interference of Mr. Cluxton, and that Mr. Cluxton's qualifications were not demanded previous to the day of polling.

ARRANGEMENTS for the public funeral of the late Lieutenant-Governor Howe are completed. The General and Admiral intend cooperating with the Provincial and civic authorities, and will make the funeral as imposing as possible. All the military and naval forces, and volunteer militia, will be present, also the national and other societies, as well as the Dominion, Provincial and civic officials. Business will be suspended for two hours during the funeral. Minute guns will be fired from the time the procession leaves the Government House till the interment.

A REMOVAL is now current in Ottawa that Sir John Macdonald is not only going to England to be sworn in as Privy Councillor, but to receive also an Imperial appointment. It is said that an arrangement was made between him and the Gladstone Government that, should he succeed in bringing Prince Edward Island and Newfoundland into Confederation, he would be appointed Governor-General of the Dominion with a peerage. Negotiations are now attempted to be re-opened with Newfoundland, and his friends hope that even yet all will come out right. The only drawback is Huntington's charge.

ONTARIO EMIGRATION AGENTS.—The Globe of Wednesday says:—We lately announced the departure for England of Mr. William Edwards, the Secretary of the Department of Agriculture and Immigration, charged by the Government with the duty of inducing into and removing varied difficulties, existing with respect to the agencies in Britain. We are, to-day in receipt of a cable telegram from our correspondent in London, announcing that Mr. Edwards has assumed the chief commissionership for England and Wales, in place of Mr. Horrocks Cocks, who appears from the despatch to have resigned that office.

Local and Other Items.

JOHN MACDONALD'S WIFE. From the Globe, a recently published article in the pages of Claxton, or Deputies of Claxton, that they have arranged for the meeting during the month of June, to be held at 11:30 a.m., at the Hotel de Ville, on June 14th, 2nd, Near Old Market Station, June 15th, 3rd, At Market, June 17th, 4th, At 10:30 a.m., June 22nd, 5th, Near Rockwood, June 23rd. This meeting will be convened at Everton, three miles from Rockwood in the Township of Erinosa. The railroad authorities have finally agreed to allow return tickets to be issued at each meeting for one third fare; the traveler having paid full fare in going to the meeting. To obtain this advantage each person must procure a certificate, prepared in printed form and signed by the President of the meeting at each meeting, to be presented to the ticket office when the return ticket is obtained.

THE MOOSE PARADE.—The question as to what shall be done with Captain Jack and his Moose followers is now being privately discussed in military and civil circles. All seem to be agreed that as the Moosees surrendered as prisoners of war, it is not to be expected that they shall be punished by the army, which, for the present will hold them in custody until further orders. The New York Herald calls for the summary hanging of all of them.

CANADA PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH.—The General Assembly of the Church met in Cook's Church, Toronto, on Tuesday evening when the Rev. Mr. Fraser, the visiting Moderator, preached the usual introductory sermon. For the reason he gave, the following address: The Rev. Wm. R. Bell, the agent of the Church, was then unanimously elected Moderator for the ensuing year, when he gave a full and detailed address.

FISHING.—Advises received on Tuesday at the Marine and Fisheries Department, Ottawa, from the Montreal Islands Fishery, that the fishing boats on the shore are a failure. Seventeen vessels that left the Island for floating ice on the 25th March had not returned by the 9th of May. The herring fisheries were also poor.

A RARE.—Dr. Van R. Bell, of Oswego county, New York, has in his possession one of the most curious gems that have ever come before the attention of the commissioners, and is pronounced by jewelers and others to be among the most exquisite of nature's specimens. Experts in gems have been puzzled to give it a distinct name. It was found by a Heron Indian on the shores of Lake Superior, and is a compound of four classes of stones agglomerated together, so as to constitute a perfect gem of rare beauty. The stones comprised in it are opal, corundum, peridot and chrysolite. Among the other remarkable features of this curious stone are the appearance on each side, as if from the hand of an engraver, of a resemblance to a miniature crown, the clearly defined form of a black-and-tan dog, the head of an owl, the tracings of the shores of little lakes, and other remarkable phenomena, rarely if ever found in stones of any kind.
