BASE BALL. LOCALS. The Borrows are expected to be in Guelph about the 18th or 20th inst. We will give the date as soon as settled.

The Maple Leaf picnic has been indefinitely postponed on account of the Kinross club again changing the date of their game to that day—the 11th. The Kinross club have now sent word that they will be here on the 11th, and not the 8th or 15th as stated in a previous issue.

The Carpenters and Moulders are to play this afternoon—if it don't rain. The Union held their meeting last night as announced. A nine has been selected, and will play with the Maple Leaf to-night. Another meeting is to be held before the match.

A big match is on the tapis, this time the contestants being three employees of the Guelph Sewing Machine Co., three from Comita's, and three from Crowe's, against a "whole team" from Mr. Raymond's factory. Greek is to meet Greek in this game. Give us the date, boys, when it's fixed.

There was some turning—not wood-turning nor turning round—but some turning over done on the Leafs practice ground last night by an aspirant for the championship and one of the leaflets themselves. HARRISTON and MOUNT FOREST clubs had a game on Monday. Harriston won, 31 to 25. The Woodstock Review speaks:—"Guelph is not so much on base ball as in the olden times. The champion nine of that place got jolly well trounced in Kingston not long ago, and now Guelphites think base ball not such a wonderful game after all.

The Galt Shamrocks and the Dauntless club of Ayr played a very close game on Saturday last in Ayr. The Shamrocks won by 2-29 to 27. The Painters and Tavern-keepers of Ayr had a game on Monday. Paint was behind 10 runs on the 9th innings—22 to 33.

The Bachelors and Bachelorettes of Elora had a game in Elora last Saturday, which resulted in favor of the bachelors by a majority of 11 innings and 12 runs. The London club lost the match with Paris yesterday by seven wickets.

Cricket Match—Guelph vs. Fergus. (Continued). This match was played on the Fergus ground on Friday, 1st August, and resulted in a total overthrow of Guelph's last opponents by eight wickets and some odd runs. Messrs. Brunell, McNamara, and Hughes played well for Fergus in the first innings, scoring respectively 10, 26, and 13; but notwithstanding this very good example, the remnant, counting extras, tallied but 22. All told, 71 Guelph cautious and steady (but playing against hard luck) soon raised the telegraph to 75, heading by 4 runs on the first innings—Messrs. Evelt, Chadwick, and Lightfoot counting 33 for the good cause. Guelph, ever ready on a fair game, sent their opponents to the wickets, and by dint of good play succeeded in disenfranchising these festive flowers of this beautifully situated but almost sequestered little hamlet of Fergus, for but 20 runs on their second journey. This is the result of crafty bowling and a nimble field. Guelph now bloomed freely, and in spite of some misfortunes soon figured up the required number of runs. Considering our representatives had but ten men all told wherewith to oppose a foreign team, composed of some good players, exclusive of Mr. Brunell, we take this opportunity of congratulating the cricketers of this town who have never yet been defeated.
