Deceased took part in the battle of the Beaver dams, which resulted in the surrender of the whole American force. He also fought at the battle of Lundy's Lane, which was the severest fight of the whole campaign. Mr. Lampman was taken prisoner during the battle and was sent to Greenbush in the State of New York, where he was confined in prison for over twelve months. He was a resident of Stamford Township for many years and died at the ripe age of 83.
