QUEBEC GOVERNMENT IS MAKING SOME MONEY

Montreal, July 25.—"For the first time in the history of the Province of Quebec," said Hon. P. S. G. MacKenzie, provincial treasurer, yesterday, "the provincial government is able to meet its loan obligations from revenue sources, and the accruing payments of the loan of 1886 are being met in this way."

"We are only meeting expenses out of ordinary revenue, but at the same time so husbanding the natural resources of the province as to provide for outstanding obligations as they fall due. And at the same time we have been able to increase the expenditure where advisable on such services as agricultural, educational, colonization, and the betterment of roads."

NUMBER OF WESTERN FRUIT INSPECTORS DOUBLED

Ottawa, Ont., July 25.—The stringent inspection which has heretofore been applied to the inspection of foreign fruit is to be extended to the domestic product in order that the consumer may get what he pays for and what is wholesome to consumption. With that end in view the minister of agriculture is doubling the number of inspectors particularly in the west, while those in the east will be increased.

THE BRITISH EMPIRES AGAIN BEING FEDERATED

Newspapers of the Empire Will be Responsible for the Union of Ideas

British Press Believes Itself to be Weighed Down With Ponderous Influence

(Toronto Star)

FROM OXFORD STREET

London, July 25.—(By Mail)—The empire is about to be federated again. The newspapers are doing it. Many public men of eminence and sincerity are encouraging or being encouraged by the newspapers.

Bishop Creighton in one of his letters says: "It is our duty to read what the newspapers tell us to do. It is our duty also not to do it. If things are so to be done they would have been done long ago." There is some wisdom in the remark.

Nevertheless we continue daily to be told that the empire is to be united in some form, political, commercial, naval and military. The scientific movement has arrived. Unfortunately these arrivals occur too often; they are like farewells of prima donnas, which leave us in the blessed hope, or the painful conviction, that we shall see them again.

Periods of Exaltation

Those whose memories can hobble back half a century will not be unfamiliar with those periods of exaltation in which the empire was to suffer some form of change into something new and strange. It was not always a change for the better.

In the sixties there was a disposition in England to look on the colonies as a source of trouble. "The days of apprenticeship" said the Times, "are over." And the troops began to be withdrawn. A new policy was about to be inaugurated and a disappointment in which the empire was to suffer some form of change into something new and strange. It was not always a change for the better.

Partial Paralysis

In the twenties there was a period of disorganization and disappointment. Lord Rosebery ceased to give his powerful aid. The leagues of various kinds suffered partial paralysis. The empire was left to take care of itself, and having had much experience during many centuries, it kept its feet.

Since 1901 when Mr. Chamberlain had started on a propagandist career as colonial minister, there has been a renewal of the policy of imperialism. Societies and leagues have sprung up everywhere. An immense mass of literature, much of it very good, has been scattered by the tariff reform commissions, naval leagues, societies for encouraging universal military training, and other establishments.

A Hopeful Press

The London press is always hopeful. It is at times a bit hysterical. It has an idea, possibly not without justification, that its utterances count for much. It was enthusiastic about Sir John Macdonald's visit to Toronto. It is enthusiastic about Mr. Borden. We may be sure it will always have a public opinion for new men and even odd ideas.

It is in many respects an admirable trait this confidence in new situations. But to those who have any sense for historical perspective, these facile enthusiasms have a theatrical air. The lesson of experience is, that an empire cannot be taken to pieces and put together again in order. We may hope that the thing can be done; but it is a task that is not easy to undertake.

DRY FARM COMMISSIONERS PLEASED WITH RECEPTION

Moguls of Many States Promise to Come to the Big Lethbridge Congress

Governors, Galore Will Be in Attendance and Many Bright Common Folks Besides

Lethbridge, Alta., July 25.—The reception accorded the Canadian commissioners of the International Dry-Farming Congress on their tour of the western states has been flattering in the extreme, and it is believed that as a result of their visits there will be official representatives from upwards of 20 states, while a dozen or more will send exhibits. As indicating the trend of public opinion it is anticipated that the governors of many of the northwestern states who have been prominent in the agitation for immigration to that section will attend, and the acceptance of the formal invitation sent out by Hon. Duncan Marshall, vice-president for Alberta of the International Dry-Farming Congress, has been received by secretary John T. Bugas from several governors.

Governor Odde of Nevada, after a conference with Hon. Daniel Morgan, one of the commissioners at Reno on Thursday, declared himself heartily in favor of urging that every western state be represented officially and that each send a large exhibit. He will be personally urged all the other governors to encourage the western states in making a grand exhibit at Lethbridge.

Governor William Stry of Utah, acknowledging the invitation sent him by Hon. Duncan Marshall, takes the opportunity of assuring the officials of the Congress of his hearty co-operation in the sending of a representative state delegation and exhibit. He plans to attend if his official duties will permit.

Governor James H. Hawley of Idaho will attend and will head the State delegation in its efforts to boost Boise for the next Congress. Governor Lee Cruise of Oklahoma will head the Okla-

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THIS MAN IS A HUMAN TUGBOAT

Samuel Finkelman, not content with having made a swim from Forty-second street and the East river to Coney Island last week, made an effort to prove that he is a human tug, competent to be licensed for the purpose of towing things around the harbor.

Finkelman's initial effort was with a rowboat containing four persons. Whether, in time, he hopes to attain to the distinction of taking a float of railroad cars from Jersey City to the Harlem river he did not say.

Finkelman made arrangements to tow "Joe" Williams, George Gallagher, Bernard Schuner and "Jack" Charlton from Jackson street up through the East river, through Hell Gate and back. He made his mistake, he thinks now, in not getting a fifth man as captain of the crew and providing the craft with a pump.

After the four had been seated in a rowboat without oars Finkelman attached the painter of the boat to a strap he had about his shoulders. Launch was sent along for safety and Finkelman started up the river with the tide. Ferryboats stopped as he passed. After a mile had been made the storm broke. The river roughened up and the rain and what water was shipped covered the bottom of the boat.

The four men in it called to Finkelman that the rowboat was likely to fill and sink.

Finkelman finally yielded to their entreaties, and swam into the slip at Twentieth street, towing the boat and four passengers. He did this however, only after the four agreed to let him tow them through Hell Gate next Sunday.
