SQUIRMING OVER THEIR OWN MEDICINE.

Having failed in the endeavor to elect
their own candidate, the London Free Press
and the Conservative bosses who brought
Mr. Esery out, in opposition to Ald.
Spencer, because the latter would on no
condition pledge himself to their views in
regard to the future, now fall back on the
excuse that they were defeated because
the Liberals refused to support their man!
The Free Press further says that one
Liberals refused to support a candidate for
school trustee because he was a Conserva-
tive, and it wishes it to be understood from
this alleged example of party preference
that its friends were at a disadvantage be-
cause they took no part in it "as an organ-
ization." Who, then, gave the secretary of
the Conservative Association power to
arrange candidature, to pull wires for the
withdrawal of one Conservative candidate
in order to make the election of outsiders of
the same stripe certain, and to solicit the
attendance of certain candidates at the rooms
of the Conservative Association, to be
entertained as to whether or not their views
satisfied the bosses?

It may have been in the late con-
test some Liberals voted as such, and for
no other reason, but if they did they did
not have far to go for satisfaction that
their course was warranted by the action of
the men who were responsible for the
appearance of Mr. Esery in the field, as
well as for the wire-pulling regarding can-
didates for other municipal positions.

Referring to the speeches recently made
by Sir Charles Tupper in England, the
Victoria, B. C. Times says:

"Tupper's regard for truth certainly
does not increase with his age."
The High Commissioner has to act
according to instructions from his mas-
ters at Ottawa, or run the risk of losing

IF CHEESE, WHY NOT BUTTER?

Within the last day or two, the Eastern
Dairymen's Association has held its meet-
ing in Brockville, and now the Western
Dairymen's Association is about to assemble
at Brantford. Important results are likely
to flow from this interchange of ideas by
the leading dairymen in the Province.
The associations, from small beginnings,
have come to be powerful organizations,
with a well-defined yet constantly broad-
ening field of operations. In 1867, H.
Rainey was carrying on a large private
dairy in Dereham township, Oxford
county, and he could show good results
from his operations. The late James
Harris, his son-in-law, knowing that the
co-operative, or factory system, had recently
been established with phenomenal suc-
cess in Herkimer county, New York, and
believing that it would provide an opening
for the energies of Canadian farmers, called
a meeting of farmers in his neighborhood,
and they held a conference with representa-
tives of business men in Ingersoll. The result
was a resolution to introduce the factory
system, and a formal convention for organ-
ization was held in Ingersoll on July 31 and
Aug. 1. Then the Canadian Dairymen's
Association was formed, and out of it has
grown the Western Dairymen's Association
—a most useful and progressive organiza-
tion.

From small beginnings the factory system
of cheesemaking has spread throughout the
West, and London has become the center of
production. The system has spread from
one end of the Province to the other. It is
indeed a non-progressive neighborhood
which does not have its cheese factory.
Moreover our exports of cheese, which
were next to nothing 25 years ago, are now
worth about \$10,000,000 a year, and what
is equally satisfactory our cheese stands
first in point of quality in the European
markets. This is due, in no small degree,
to the efforts of the dairymen's associations,
coupled with the aid and countenance of
the Government of Ontario, which has been
ever ready to place before the dairymen
all the latest scientific and practical infor-
mation.

It is a misfortune that while so much at-
tention has been given to the production of
good cheese in Canada, but little care has
been taken to put our butter on the market
in a manner calculated to bring the best
financial results. While the demand for
Canadian cheese has yearly increased, our
sales of butter abroad have dwindled away,
and now do not approach what they were
twenty or thirty years ago. Last summer
owing to an unusual scarcity in the British
markets, a brisk demand for Canadian
butter set in and we have but to produce
a quality of butter as we do of cheese
to sell in ever-increasing quantities. The
Trade Bulletin agrees with us on this point,
and adduces as evidence the fact that
Australia and New Zealand can find such a
profitable outlet for their butter although
they are much further from the English
market than we are. By the last mail from
London it is stated that large quantities of
the steamer product are being landed by
each steamer from the great continent of
the Southern Pacific and fetching good
prices, as high as 12s to 12s 6d being realized
for finest qualities, which is equal to
about 23c to 25c per pound here. Now the
question arises: "How is it possible that
New Zealand and Southern Australia can
produce butter and ship it 11,000 or 12,000
miles, crossing the equator, and land it in
London and receive several shillings more
per cwt. than the finest Canadian butter
will fetch on the same market?" This
certainly is a question which should cause
Canadian butter-makers to blush when it
is considered that they have all the home
advantages possessed by the New Zealanders,
besides the special one of a comparatively
short run of about 3,000 miles in
order to land it in Liverpool. The
Trade Bulletin asks why we should
not get our full share of the English mar-
ket for butter in ordinary years as well as
in a year of paucity like the present? There
is certainly no reason why Canadian
butter should not be quite as much a neces-
sity in the English market as the Irish,
Danish, Normandy and New Zealand pro-
ducts are. But two conditions are re-
quisite—our farmers must produce it equally
good and be able to sell it at as low prices.
There is no sentiment in the British pur-
chaser. He will buy from a Hottelet or a
Chinaman just as soon as he will from a
Canadian, and sooner if the other fellows
have better or cheaper goods.

What the Canadian farmers must do
in order to increase their sales of
butter in Britain is to have it
marketed at stated intervals, and
in a fresh condition. Canada makers
have always been slow to selling their
summer make when it is fresh, as they ad-
here to the principle that it pays better to
carry their butter all through the summer
into fall to realize the higher prices
which sometimes prevail then and some-
times do not. Canadians need to be con-
verted to the view that the best results are
to be obtained from co-operative butter-
making; they need to realize that the finest
butter will not bring a good price if it is
not marketed in its most perfect condition.
Butter is not like cheese. It cannot be kept
in a cellar for months, to await opportu-
nities for speculation without running the
risk of depreciation in quality, and prob-
ably resulting in heavy loss. It cannot be
mixed hodge-podge fashion, the finest with
the poorest in quality, days after leaving
the churn, and be sold as it might be were
the scientific system of producing and
marketing it in a fresh condition, at stated
intervals, followed out.

Even John L. Sullivan, the notorious
prize-fighter, is compelled to testify to the
beneficial effects of temperate habits.
He wants to get into the best possible
fighting trim before his match with
Slavin, and his first step is to take the
pledge that he will drink no intoxicating
liquors for one year. He knows that the
more liquors a man takes the greater is
the impairment of his physical strength,
to say nothing of the effects on his mental
and nervous system. Proof from so un-
willing a source is proof indeed.

LIQUOR LAW IMPROVEMENT.

On the 1st inst., the new Provincial
Liquor Law came into force in British
Columbia. The Pacific Coast legislators
have had the good sense to model the new
statute somewhat after the Crooks Act
though this measure is scarcely as strict as
the liquor law in this Province. The new
law enacts that no bar-room is to be open
from 11 o'clock on Saturday night till 1
o'clock on the Monday morning following.
During these hours no liquor is to be sold
from bar-rooms except when called for by a
physician's requisition. Nor must any
liquor, whether sold or not, be drunk on the
premises except by the occupant or some
member of his family. For the first infrac-
tion the fine is \$20 to \$50, and for a second
\$30 to \$100. These provisions are not to
apply to the furnishing of liquor to bona-
fide travelers, nor to the case of hotel and
restaurant keepers supplying liquor to their
guests. The law is a great improvement on
that which formerly governed the sale of
liquors in British Columbia and will be
welcomed by temperance men as an
earnest of better things to come.

THE FAILURES.

past year in the Dominion and Newfound-
land, as reported by Dunn, Wiman & Co., is

THE Manchester Chamber of Commerce
has informed Mr. Howard Vincent, M.P.,
that the subject of "the furtherance of
mutually advantageous trading relations
upon a preferential basis between the
various sections of the British people"
had already engaged the attention of the
Chamber on various occasions, and no
useful purpose could be served by a meet-
ing on the subject. Mr. Vincent is ap-
parently unequal to the contract that he
undertook when in Canada. There is no
general movement in favor of a resort to
a tax on breadstuffs by the British people,
nor is there likely to be. They know the
benefits of freedom of trade.

THE total amount of the interest and non-
interest bearing debt of the United States
has now been reduced to \$975,981,946.
But for the payments for pensions for
services in the late war the debt would
be wiped out in the next five or six
years. As it is, if the States keep out of
trouble with other countries, their people
will have virtually no debt on which to
provide interest before many years have
passed. Is it not about time that Can-
ada was beginning to reduce rather
than increase her debt and taxation? If
we want to make Canada an attractive
country to live in, and keep our popula-
tion here, we must set about reducing
both debt and taxation at once. We
need a change of system and of men at
Ottawa as speedily as possible.

NO CHILD'S PLAY.

The Globe, Mail and Empire, of Toronto,
all announce an increase of yearly sub-
scription from \$5 to \$6 for the future.
They announce that their former rates
were too low for the expenses necessary to keep
them up. Newspaper competition is so
great in Canada that the profits, if any, are
very small. Few people have an idea of
the amount of labor and expense necessary
in maintaining a daily paper.

THE CZAR'S CLOSE CALL.

A Boy Turned the Hands of an "In-
ternal" Clock the Wrong Way.
BERLIN, Jan. 8.—The Kreuz Zeitung
publishes an account of the manner in
which it is alleged the accident to the
Czar's train at Pozna on Oct. 17, 1888,
really originated. The account states that
a kitchen boy who was employed on the
Imperial train, and who was supposed to
have been killed in the accident, escaped
death and that he was recently arrested on
suspicion of being a nihilist and handed
over to the Russian police. According to
the Kreuz Zeitung this youth since his
arrest has confessed that he placed an in-
ternal clock in the compartment next to
the Imperial dining-room and fearing that
it would explode too soon turned it the
wrong way, with the result that it exploded
in a downward direction causing the ac-
cident.

A dispatch from South Australia reports
that the English Ministry there has re-
signed. The Governor, the Earl of Kin-
rore, has requested ex-Premier Playford to
form a new cabinet.
