MIDDLESEX.

Barry Brook, an Englishman, 27 years
old, working at Napier, got drunk in Strath-
roy the other day and was found dead in
the stable of the Queen's Hotel next morn-
ing. Alcoholic poisoning was the cause
assigned. Deceased worked at Ormrod's
cheese factory, Napier, for some time.

Strathroy Collegiate Institute has
opened with 175 pupils. The number will
run up to 200 shortly.

into diphtheria. The Board of Health have
taken prompt measures to prevent the
spread of this terrible disease, the opening
of the school was postponed and the Sunday
schools closed on Sunday last. The family

INSECT SURGEONS.

Bees Restore a Man's Hearing by Sting-
ing His Ears.

STOUCHELL, S. D., Aug. 30.—W. L.
Jones, a farmer living a few miles from
town, has just recovered his hearing in a
most remarkable manner. Five years ago
he became very deaf, and since then,
though he has tried various kinds of treat-
ment, his hearing has been practically
gone. The other day he was working with
a swarm of bees, and many of them, getting
under the net which covered his face,
stung him severely on the ears. The next
day his deafness left him, and now he can
not only hear with his old power, but his
hearing is much more acute than formerly.
The physician who had charge of the case
is unable to account for the change except
by attributing it to the sting of the bees.

THE HAUNTED SCHOOL.

Its Teacher Has Gone to Toronto.

Variations Detected in the Mysterious
Noises—A Brave Act Performed
by the Lady.

TORONTO, Aug. 30.—Miss Annie R. Mc-
Kechnie, the lady who, until a few days
ago, was teacher at the now famous
"haunted school house" in Grey county, is
at present staying in Toronto, having
definitely resigned her position as teacher
and her resignation having been accepted by
the trustees. In an interview with a
Globe reporter she entirely corroborated
the article upon the occurrences which
appeared on the 27th of this month; every
detail, she said, was correct. Miss Mc-
Kechnie is by no means the sort of young
lady that would appear likely to be either
the subject of any hypnotic influence, as has
been alleged, or herself to be the wielder of
such a power in so irresponsible and erratic
a manner. She is a bright, handsome and
intelligent girl, and her clear-cut features
and decided expression indicate a deter-
mined and thoroughly sane mind. The
change from the neighborhood of the
school, where she was regarded with con-
stant suspicion and was the object of con-
siderable active hostility, has had a bene-
ficial effect upon her health; but she still
shows signs of the terrific strain which has
been put upon her nerves. That she is a
girl of great pluck and strength of mind is
shown by the fact that on the neighbors
circulating a story that every evening at 9
o'clock the apparition of a lady dressed in
white was seen to pass from the new school
house to the old one, she waited at the door
of the old school house absolutely alone one
evening until 9:30 o'clock. Needless to
say the apparition did not appear. There
was no one within half a mile.

Some interesting details were given by
Miss McKechnie of the nature of the
noises which were heard. On the second
day the barking sound which was men-
tioned was very pronounced; it seemed to
come from four children in particular, two
boys and two girls, and at one time it
seemed as if the four were actually fighting;
four distinct barks were heard, one
gruff, quiet high, and two midway, and
these seemed to contend with each other;
the atmosphere got close and heavy, and
set them all coughing. For a long time the
sound followed these four children, and
was especially loud when they sat with
their backs to the wainscoting; when they
went out it was quickly would cease.

Miss McKechnie stood up for the children,
and this was declared to be a reason for
thinking her responsible for the noises,
though the train of reasoning is not very
clear. One very singular circumstance
mentioned by Miss McKechnie was that
when the sound seemed to be coming
from a corner their chests would
heave and their throats move, though
their lips would be perfectly quiet.

The children did not seem aware of
this, and to them the noise seemed to come
from the nearest piece of wood, such as a
desk. When the children were reciting the
multiplication table the noise would
accompany them; when they whispered it
would be low, when they shouted it would
be as loud as they, and when they
dropped from a shout to a whisper the
sound would drop, too. A girl sang, and
the sound accompanied her. An odd cir-
cumstance was that the noise was never so
loud when Public School Inspector Camp-
bell was in the room; moreover, it would
be done so as to avoid him, and the corner
to another as he followed it. The sound
would often vary, and on the second day
after moving back into the school from the
temporary quarters it was of a whistling
nature; Miss McKechnie counted 66
distinct whistles in one hour.

IS IT A PERIPETATIC GHOST?
It is to be hoped that Miss McKechnie
can be induced to teach at least one les-
son in the new school house; so far the sound
has been confined to the old building, and
it will be of the greatest interest to ascer-
tain whether the noises would occur on her
going to the new building; there are not a
few who would be much surprised if the
sounds were to prove not confined to the
old building.

In connection with the explanation of the
"phantom photograph" given by Mr.
Fraser, Mr. G. F. Chapman, of Mount
Forest, the proprietor of the photograph
gallery as follows: "If the image appeared
through a hole in the camera it would have
done so in a group; and then again it
seems strange that the image appears
at this peculiar time. I have taken other
photos of the building, inside and outside,
and no image appeared."

SHOT IN HIS GOOD LEG.
His Cork Leg Prevented an Innocent
Bystander from Retreating.

George Gilroy, of 427 East Seventy-third
street, has no employment, is an ex-convict,
and carries a revolver. Yesterday he and
his companions got drunk. They wandered
up to First avenue, which at Seventy-third
street is known as the Bohemian Broadway.
They amused themselves for a time chasing
Bohemians. About 6:30 o'clock, at First
avenue and Seventy-seventh street, they
began to quarrel among themselves. Gilroy
began to shoot. He fired two shots up
First avenue, one in the air, and the fourth
down the street.

Glaser, a Polish cigarmaker with a cork
leg, was going home with a bundle under
his arm. He heard the shots and tried to
get out of the way, but his cork leg would
not help him. Gilroy's fourth bullet hit
his good leg. He fell. The street was
crowded. The cry of "murder" was raised.
Several men seized Gilroy, and some phil-
anthropists hit him on the head with a
bottle of catsup. The bottle broke and
Gilroy succumbed, mistaking the catsup for
blood. Both of the injured men were taken
to St. Vincent's Hospital. Gilroy was
arrested. All of his companions
escaped. [New York Sun.

DR. GARDINER RESIGNS

His Membership of the Local Board
of Health.

The Latter Rescinds Its Own Resolution
—The Mayor's Objection to a
Deputation—Not Enough
Aldermen On It.

A special meeting of the Board of Health
was called last night under peculiar cir-
cumstances. At the last meeting it was
moved by Dr. English, seconded by Mayor
Essery, that the chairman (Ald. F. J.
Fitzgerald), Dr. Gardiner and Dr. Hutcheon,
M.H.O., be a deputation to attend the
annual meeting of the American Health
Association in Montreal next week.

Since then the mayor got up a petition,
signed by six members, objecting to the
deputation and calling a special meeting in
reference thereto. Accordingly there were
present last night Ald. F. J. Fitzgerald,
Ald. Wm. Heaman, ex-Ald. Skinner, Ald.
Searrow, Dr. English, Ald. Parnell, Ald.
O'neill, Ald. Coe, the mayor, and Dr.
Hutchinson, medical health officer.

The mayor started off by moving that
the previous resolution be rescinded and
the deputation not appointed. The mayor
acknowledged that he did so because some
of the aldermen had kicked against the
personnel of the deputation. It had been
said that the aldermen didn't count in
this matter, but he (the mayor) wished
it understood that the aldermen were
just as much experts on the subjects to
be discussed, as these other men (the
doctors). Aldermen came and
went, but doctors were there all the time.
The mayor also pleaded economy.

Aldermen then read from Dr. Gardi-
ner, as follows:

"I am informed that a meeting has been
called to reconsider the advisability of
sending a deputation to the American
Health Association at Montreal.

"I had the honor of being named on that
deputation, and I accepted the trust, be-
lieving that the knowledge there gained
would be of material advantage to
the city at large, and also with
the hope that as I had been on the board for
many years and had never been away from
the city at the expense of the city, the
board by sending me had intended to
recognize my past services in the city's in-
terest. I was mistaken, it seems, and
after the action taken by the majority of
the board in calling a meeting to reconsider
the advisability of sending a deputation, I
do not feel at liberty in being present at
the meeting and will stay away, but if it
is decided by the board that in the interest
of the city the deputation do not go I will
consider it a desire on the part of the
city, and I will not be a member of it, and
will immediately send in my resignation to
the City Council.

"J. H. GARDINER, M.D."

The letter was received in silence. Then
Ald. O'Meara seconded the mayor's motion
disallowing the deputation, and it was car-
ried, Dr. English voting nay. Dr. English
previously stated that the best sanitarians
on the continent would attend the con-
vention, and great benefits would be gained
by personal attendance which could be ob-
tained in no other manner.

The board then drifted into general busi-
ness. Ald. O'Meara complained of the
rank odors from the sewers, and the
medical health officer contended that they
had been regularly flushed. Ald. Coe re-
marked that some of them "stank like
fury." The chairman said the sewer op-
erated the convent on Dundas street might
be flushed one day and it would be as bad
the next. A general flushing will probably be
ordered.

The medical health officer intimated that
Carling's Creek needed cleaning. It will be
attended to.

DUEL ABOUT BRECK.

Two Old Friends Meet and One Bites
the Dust.

CINCINNATI, Aug. 30.—John King, a
Breckinridge man, living in Fayette
county, Ky., met on the highway his old
friend George Cook, who lives in Clark
county. Cook said that any woman who
went to hear Breckinridge speak was no
better than a courtesan.

King dismounted from his horse, saying
his wife and daughters had heard Breckin-
ridge.

Cook insisted it was a shame. He also
dismounted. Both drew knives and blood flowed
freely until Cook dropped. King has escaped.

HOW WIRE IS MADE.

A Very Interesting and Unique Mechan-
ical Process.

The rod is received by the wire-drawer
in the form of a coil, the rod being of
varying section and the coil of a weight
depending upon the purpose for which it
is intended. One end of the rod is
pointed and somewhat reduced by
machinery. The coil is then given a
bath in mild acid to remove all oxida-
tion, after which it is washed in lime water
to give a drawing surface, and is finally
dried in a proper oven. When ready
for drawing, the pointed rod is inserted
in one of the holes of a drawing plate.
This plate is generally of steel, but some
factories use cast iron. The drawing
holes are conical and the rod is inserted
from the larger end. On the other side
of the plate the pointed end is seized by
power pincers and pulled out, and ready
has been drawn through to allow of its
being passed around and fastened to a
drum or reel which is driven by power.
Of course, the rod is reduced in area
and much elongated, and this without
any perceptible loss of metal. While
passing through the plate it is kept in
contact with what is called wire-
drawers' soap or grease. After being
drawn through the hole it is put through
a series of smaller ones until it has been
brought down to a requisite size. But
the compression and disturbance of the
structure of the rod consequently upon
such reductions has hardened it so
much that at certain stages it is neces-
sary to stop the process and soften the
metal by annealing. After this it is
oriented with acid, etc., and the
drawing is resumed. Iron and the
harder grades of steel require five or
six annealings while being reduced to
the finer gauges of wire. But the man-
ufacture of soft steel and the details of
rolling it into rods have been so per-
fected that steel rods can now be
drawn into fence wire without any
cleaning or annealing. After the final
drawing the wire is finished in various
ways, depending upon the purposes for
which it is intended.

No matter of what metal the wire
may be composed, the same general sys-
tem of drawing is used, varying more
or less according to the metal. Including
gold silver, platinum, copper, etc., the
commercial sizes of wire run from 1/4
inch to 1-700 inch in diameter.—Cas-
ier's Mar.
