THE VENEZUELAN DISPUTE.

London, April 22.—The Times prints
a long dispatch from Mr. C. W. Smalley,
its correspondent in America, which
is devoted to dispelling the illusions
that the Venezuelan boundary dispute
has passed a dangerous stage, that
the negotiations are prospering, and
that the British blue book on the
subject created a favorable impres-
sion in the United States. Mr.
Smalley says the situation which the
foregoing beliefs is well founded.
No agreement as to principles has
been reached, and negotiations are
at a standstill. Nobody seems to
know when or how they will be re-
newed, or the deadlock removed. If
the American commission draws the
Venezuelan line, the alternative
stated in President Cleveland's mes-
sage will have to be faced. Mr. Smal-
ley says that the Venezuelans at
Salisbury, who rejected the proposals
made by the Washington Government
in February, and who does not appear
to have made concessions which the
Times says it cannot fully share the
gloomy anticipations contained in
the dispatch, although the reminder
of the Venezuelan line is not so
that Mr. Smalley elsewhere in his dis-
patch shows that Lord Salisbury has
taken other action for opening a dis-
cussion of a scheme for general arbi-
tration, to which the paper attaches
importance. It also contends that if
the general project fails, Great Britain
ought yet to be able, with prudence,
to resume the specific case with Ven-
ezuela. The paper remarks upon the
good-will of the Washington Govern-
ment, testified in Cleveland's mes-
sage, and that the Venezuelans have
sent a letter to Consul Parker, the sen-
timents in which are reciprocated here.

BRUSH WITH THE MATEABLES.

London, April 22.—A Pretoria dis-
patch to the Daily Telegraph says that
a telegram was received from Bulu-
wayo on Monday morning, April 20,
telling of a sharp skirmish between
the forces of the British and the
Matabeles on the Com-
manche. There were 150 friendly
natives engaged on the British side,
the enemy The Government forces
were unharmed.

A later telegram received at Pre-
toria from Buluwayo says: There was
another sharp skirmish near the south-
eastern suburb of the town. The Afri-
kander corps gallantly attacked a fort
held by the Matabeles, who were in a
strong position. There was a sharp
hand-to-hand fight. The whites lost
one killed and one wounded.

KRUGER'S CLAIM CUT DOWN.

London, April 22.—The Daily News
asserts that President Kruger's original
demand for an indemnity from the
Chartered South African Company for
Jameson's raid was \$15,000,000, but
negotiations have reduced it to \$7,500,000.

The Berlin correspondent of the
Standard says that the British Gov-
ernment is studying in the uttermost
secrecy England's action in
South Africa, in which they see a
hardy message to the Transvaal.
They charge Chamberlain with dupli-
city in his statements to Parliament
and in his messages to President Kruger.

DELAGO BAY.

London, April 22.—The real anxiety of
the Transvaal Republic is with regard
to England's known ambition to ac-
quire Delagoa Bay. The Dutch burgh-
ers want the fine harbor for them-
selves, and the Transvaal Government
wishes to keep it. The bay is a com-
mercial growth must remain limited
by the lack of a seaport. Mr. Cham-
berlain recently denied that there is "even
a shadow of a possibility" of the Trans-
vaal Republic being sold to England.
But he never denied
—because he cannot—that there have
been negotiations for the sale of the bay
to England has not bought it, she will
buy when that is practicable.

A FRENCH TANGLE.

Paris, April 22.—In spite of the pro-
test of the Premier, M. Bourgeois, the
Senate has adopted a motion to post-
pone the vote on Madagascar until
credits until a Cabinet is formed which
enjoys the confidence of both cham-
bers.

It was officially announced last
evening that the Ministry, in view of
the Senate's attitude in barring the
expenditure necessary to maintain
the status of the Transvaal, had decid-
ed to resign, but were unwilling to
abandon office before explaining to
the Chamber of Deputies the facts of
the situation. Subsequently M. Bur-
geois informed President Faure of
the result of the conference, and af-
terwards conferred with M. Brisson,
President of the Chamber of Deputies,
who then summoned that body to
meet on Thursday. The Chamber
adjourned on April 2, not intending
to meet again until May 19.

AT THE FRONT.

Cairo, April 22.—Further reports from
the front received state that beyond an
occasional volley at long range, the
Dervishes are very quiet. All posted
military men are inclined to the belief
that the Dervish leaders are preparing
for a sudden movement of importance.
There has been great activity in the
pushing forward of troops and sup-
plies to the front, and from the re-
marks dropped here and there it would
seem that fighting is expected before
long. The friendly sheik, Abdul Azim,
has returned to Murad Wells, after
having made a demonstration with
his horsemen, south of the Nile, be-
cause he found no trace of the
Dervishes, but heard there was a force
of the enemy at Abuhama.

Abdul Azim, a friendly sheik, who
was despatched to Murad with 200
Arabs, with orders to scout toward
the Shagheh country, passed through
Schirri Island on to the south. He
reports that the inhabitants related
at the news of the expedition, but
could not proffer help at present,
through fear of the Dervishes.
