

RAILWAY RUMBLINGS.

April Earnings-To Head Off Scalpers-Concessions to Cyclists. Western roads are again cutting freight rates, and a meeting was held

in Chicago last week with a view to stopping the demoralization. J. H. Hanna, formerly traveling freight agent of the G. T. R., has been appointed assistant foreign freight agent, with headquarters at Toronto.

The aggregate earnings of all roads in the United States reporting for April is \$28,236,258, an increase of 2.8 per cent compared with last year, and a decrease of 8.8 per cent compared with the corresponding period of 1893. Western roads have just completed the organization of a mileage bureau, the object of which is to prevent the brokerage of 1,000 and 2,000 mile books. Experts who have examined the plan declare it will be almost an impossi-bility for scalpers to handle that class of transportation in the future unless

the railroads themselves open the way. A Toronto dispatch says: The management of the G. T. R. are making a new departure in Bruce county. They intend in future to run fast stock trains from Palmerston to To-ronto each Monday and Thursday. Cattle will be picked up on all lines running to Palmerston. The trains will reach Toronto at 8 o'clock on the evening of the day of departure. The drovers in charge of the cattle will be accommodated in a passenger coach attached to the trains.

Eleven years ago in Toronto, Joseph Kiefer, a resident of Buffalo, was killed in a rear-end collision on the Grand Trunk Railway. His mother, Mary Kiefer, who lives in Buffalo, began an action against the Grand Trunk for the statutory maximum, in those days, of \$5,000. The case has been pending for eleven years in the various courts of this country, and on Saturday Surgrate Marcus harded downwards Surgrate Marcus harded downwards rogate Marcus handed down a decision dismissing a petition of the railroad company to have certain letters of adpractically successor to Mechanical ministration, which were heretofore awarded by the Surrogate Court of this country to Mary Kiefer, revoked. The case now once more goes to the Su-

preme Court. The struggle between the railways and the bicyclers is gradually turning in favor of the latter in the question of the free transportation of wheels for passengers who ride on first class tickets. The law in New York State makes it impossible for the roads to make an extra charge for carrying a passenger's wheel, and now some of the other roads have come to the same point without being forced to do so by any law. The Pennsylvania has an-nounced that it will carry wheels free, and the Lake Shore and Michigan Southern have followed the example. It is reported that competition will soon bring the other roads into line, and that before the summer is ended all the roads will be treating wheels as baggage. West of Chicago there as a charge made by all roads of at least 25 cents for transporting a bicycle any and the passenger agents as baggage. 
