BOUNDARY TREATY.

ROYAL VISITORS IN GLASGOW.

GLASGOW, Scotland, Sept. 10.—The Duke and Duchess of York this morning received the civic authorities, and opened the new Princess dock. The city was profusely decorated in honor of the visit of their royal highnesses.

GLASGOW AND TURKEY.

Constantinople, Sept. 10.—The ambassadors met in conference again with reference to the details of the peace treaty, but there was no definite advance in the negotiations. Germany and Great Britain have not yet come to an agreement as to the indemnity question.

THE WAR IN EGYPT.

London, Sept. 10.—The Daily Mail's correspondent at Cairo says it is rumored there that the advance of the Anglo-Egyptian column, under Gen. Sir Herbert Kitchener, to Khartoum will be delayed until January, owing to a lack of funds. The troops, meantime, will be concentrated at Bent.

POWDERLY'S LATEST IDEA.

London, Sept. 10.—In response to the request of the government, of the United States, the authorities of Scotland Yard have been directed by her majesty's government to furnish information to the United States authorities when anarchists are known to be embarking for the United States.

CHANCELLOR HOHENLOHE'S SUCCESSOR.

London, Sept. 10.—The London Mail's Berlin correspondent hears that Prince Hohenlohe's successor as imperial chancellor will not be Baron Von Bulow, the German ambassador at Rome, but Gen. Von Bulow, now in command of the fourteenth army corps.

A HINT TO UNCLE SAM.

London, Sept. 10.—The Daily Mail, in an editorial on the reported preparations in the United States for a fight with Spain, warns the American government and the Americans that they had better content themselves with writing warlike articles and firing Fourth of July squibs, instead of rushing into battle with "stupid Europeans, who mean business and fire real bullets."

PLEASED THE QUEEN.

London, Sept. 10.—The Queen has written the following letter to Earl Cadogan, lord-lieutenant of Ireland, with reference to the recent visit of the Duke and Duchess of York: "I am greatly pleased to hear of the very loyal and kind reception which my dear grandchildren met with everywhere in Ireland, and I would ask you to let this expression of mine be generally known."

THE ALLEGED ALLIANCE.

Dental That Even a Verbal Treaty Was Made Between France and Russia.

London, Sept. 9.—The Daily News' Berlin correspondent says it is alleged on reliable authority at St. Petersburg that no written alliance between Russia and France exists, and that not even a verbal treaty was made, for the military convention was of an earlier date.

LABOR'S PARLIAMENT.

Proceedings of the Labor Congress at Birmingham—Employment of Children.

Birmingham, England, Sept. 9.—The Trades' Union Congress today adopted a resolution recommending all societies and individuals to abstain from all means possible to restrict or abolish overtime in their respective trades.

THE FOLLOWING RESOLUTION PASSED: "That this congress be of opinion that the law as it relates to intimidation during strikes or lockouts is unfair and unjust, as it allows employers to blacklist workers or to discharge or obtain the discharge of workers who may have been on strike or locked out; thus intimidating workers from pursuing their lawful employment." The Trend of Trade.

Dun's Review Reports Continued Improvement

In Various Lines of Business—Con- dence Restored—Falling Off in Failures Compared With Last Year.

Toronto, Sept. 10.—Dun & Co.'s weekly review of trade in Canada says: General reports of business in the Montreal district are of a more favorable character, on the whole, the demand for several lines showing improvement, country merchants being generally more cheerful in their views as to collections this fall and their own ability to meet their obligations. The fall millinery openings taking place this week have attracted a good many visitors from Eastern Ontario, the Ottawa Valley and Quebec Province generally, and though large purchases are exceptional, the aggregate of business is reported to be gratifying. The dry goods warehouses give evidence of a fair degree of business, and wholesale grocers report some improvement in demand. Metals and hardware do not show any great activity, but oils and paints are in rather better request, and some very fair recent acquisitions are being made. The money market presents no new features, and call funds are still readily available at 3 1/2 per cent.

There is an improvement in whole- sale trade at Toronto. Some lines, in fact, are showing a decided revival, with Toronto's exhibition the chief attraction, but among them are many country stores and peddlers who are leaving lots of orders.

The sentiment in business circles is much healthier than for years, and it would seem that confidence is again fully restored. Farmers are getting better prices for their produce, and with the increased movement of grain later on the outlook is indeed very encouraging. The weather has continued most favorable for the completion of harvesting operations, and exports of cheese and butter continue active, at what may be considered fairly satisfactory prices. The money market presents no new features, and call funds are still readily available at 3 1/2 per cent.

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
