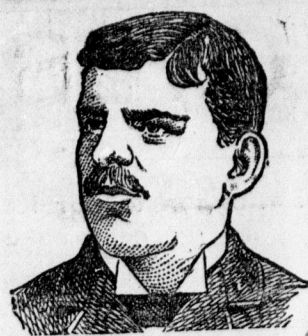

Late Canadian News

Sudden Death of a Young Man in Dentist's Chair at Ottawa—New Oil Gusher Near Bethwell.

At Norwich local option was defeated by seven votes.

The Huron county house of refuge by-law carried in Seneca by a large majority.

Fifty Chinamen from New York passed through Ottawa on Tuesday en route to China.

At Ottawa the three by-laws for railway bonuses and bridge-building, involving \$125,000, carried.

At St. Marys the by-law to reduce the hotel liquor license from eight to four was defeated by 401 majority.

The customs receipts for December, 1892, at Halifax were \$512,306 55, as compared with \$481,236 72 in December, 1891.

Voting on the local option laylaw in Sunderland, Ont., on Tuesday resulted in the defeat of the act by 200 majority.

At Sarnia the \$15,000 by-law for water works improvements was defeated. The horse fire service laylaw carried by a small majority.

A. C. Strathdee, the energetic and popular agent of the Grand Trunk Railway at Wingham for the past five years, has received the Brantford appointment.

The amount of customs duties collected at the Port of Montreal for the year 1892 was \$6,812,063 63, as against \$7,297,228 51, a decrease of \$485,144 88 for the year.

At Amherstburg the by-law granting \$25,000 to the Windsor, Sandwich and Amherstburg Railway carried by a large majority; also the bonus granting \$5,000 to the M. C. R. R. for extension into the town.

Fred. Foote, who went to Saginaw, Mich., from Toronto nine months ago, was shot and killed Saturday evening by his brother George. They had quarreled on the annexation question. George, who was arrested, said he fired in self-defense.

The Mobey oil well, just across the river from Bethwell, that was shot with dynamite last week, did well all the pump gave way, averaging about 50 barrels in twelve hours, the oil being of the very finest quality.

Pierre Charbonneau, a respectable connected young man, died very suddenly in the operating chair of Dr. Farnell, an Ottawa dentist, on Saturday evening. He had gone into the doctor's office to have a tooth extracted, but before the operation was begun he expired without the slightest warning. Death resulted from heart disease.

HAGEN WON. MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., Jan. 2.—The five mile skating race between Hagen and McCormick, which took place here yesterday, was won by Hagen. Time, 16 minutes, 23 1/2 seconds. McCormick's time, 16 minutes, 24 seconds. Hagen gave McCormick a handicap of half a lap.

Fire at Wheeling.

COLUMBIA, Ohio, Jan. 2.—Caldwell & Peterson's corrugating works at Wheeling, West Virginia, were burned this morning. Loss, \$100,000.

Struck by an Avalanche.

SPOKANE, Jan. 2.—A snow plow was wrecked yesterday on the Great Northern western Railroad. Four lives were lost. The disaster occurred near Java station, 60 miles east of Kalispel, Mont. The plow was standing on the track and was struck by an avalanche.

LONDON, Jan. 2.—The Prince of Wales has consented to sit as a member of the royal commission on the aged poor, of which Lord Aberdeen is chairman.

PARIS, Jan. 2.—The Economist says the decline of securities on European exchanges since the beginning of the Panama proceedings amounts to at least 2,800,000 francs.

Devoured by Wolves.

LONDON, Jan. 3.—A despatch from Warsaw says that the Polish painter, Wierzinski, while out riding, was attacked by wolves near Bielestok and both he and his horse were devoured.

Gri-Stelling in Vienna.

VIENNA, Jan. 2.—Many parents have reported to the police in the last four days the loss of their daughters, between 8 and 12 years of age. It is feared that the children are the victims of a criminal conspiracy.

Serious Character of a Miners' Strike.

BERLIN, Jan. 2.—The authorities are considerably agitated by the serious character of the strike of coal miners in the Sauer district, and yesterday four battalions of foot and a large force of gendarmery were ordered to the scene. The number of strikers has increased rapidly and now they number about 22,000. Many of them have arms and serious rioting is reported.

Derivatives Make Trouble.

CAIRO, Jan. 2.—The Derivatives in Southern Egypt are displaying renewed activity.

On Saturday a large party of them attacked the village of Gemal, near Wady-Halla, but were repulsed after a fierce fight in which several of them were killed. They cut a number of telegraph wires, and did other mischief. On Sunday a second attack was made on Gemal, but the raiders were again driven off, a number of them being killed.

Anarchist Activity in France.

LONDON, Jan. 2.—The Paris correspondent of the Chronicle says: "Many Anarchist revolutionary proclamations have been found plastered in Paris. They are eagerly read by the people, but the police erase them as quickly as possible."

There is no doubt preparations have been made for street manifestations, but such attempts are not likely to be serious as the police are fully cognizant of the plans of the revolutionists.

At an Anarchist meeting, held in Belleville yesterday, an orator Lebonchere was hooted by the audience, who believed he was a police agent engaged in fomenting the revolution.

Trouble in Africa.

LONDON, Jan. 2.—The Times says authentic news has been received of a serious state of affairs in Africa. The Khans are sending a strong body of men from Omdurman to attack Kerkheh's force established at Lada, north of Wadai.

The result will probably be a serious disturbance along the Upper Nile. Kerkheh should easily persuade the anti-Medist tribes to join him in repelling the attack and even carrying war into the Khalifa's dominions. Whether or not England has come to terms with King Leopold and the proved the move on Lada, no time should be lost in taking effective possession of the British sphere as far as Lake Albert and the Upper Nile, letting it be clearly understood that England means to uphold her interests in that region.

The Wedding of Princess Margaret.

LONDON, Jan. 2.—The wedding of Princess Margaret of Prussia, a sister of the Emperor, to Prince Frederick of Hesse, son of the late Landgrave of Hesse and the Landgravine Anne, Princess of Prussia, will take place on Jan. 25. The ceremony will be preceded on Jan. 23 by a State banquet. Jan. 27 will be the 35th anniversary of the Emperor's birth. All the wedding guests will attend service in the royal chapel, after which a reception and State dinner will be given, followed by a gala performance at the opera. Tradesmen are rejoicing at the prospect of receiving orders that will last until the end of February. The King of Denmark, the Duke and Duchess of Cornwall, and many other royal personages will attend the wedding. The presence of the Czar is uncertain, though it is reported that he has accepted the invitation extended to him.

Coal Miners Made Happy.

WILKESBARRE, Pa., Jan. 2.—The Lehigh and Wilkesbarre Coal Company issued orders to-day to start up their three collieries at Plymouth on Wednesday morning. Nottingham colliery, which was flooded out about three months ago, is expected to resume in about one-half the capacity. The employees, over 4,000 in number, are in high glee to-night over the prospect.

Fighting for Position.

The following characteristic and historical letter has been addressed by General Field, People's candidate for Vice-President, to General Weaver, People's candidate for President:

Dear General.—The smoke of the conflict has sufficiently lifted to enable us to survey the field and, to some extent, estimate the results. But before attempting this, allow me to congratulate you upon the splendid canvass you have made for the wealth-producers of this great country. The political history of the country furnishes no parallel to the magnitude of your labors, nor to the degree of success that has attended and resulted from them. I trust that the consciousness of duty and patriotic labor well and nobly of all rewards. When the vindictiveness and asperities of partisan antagonism shall have died away, I believe there will be by the popular verdict accorded to you for your noble labors need of praise few have received and hardly any but yourself deserved.

Now, as to the results. We have been disappointed in the South. We expected to carry a few of the States and elect quite a number of representatives in Congress. In this we failed. But I am not, and hope you are not, disposed to condemn hastily the people of the South. You realize, I know, the power and number of influences combining and operating against us on the minds of the people. And you know that truth does not always triumph in the first conflict.

In the West and Northwest we had better organizations, not so many prejudicial influences, nor so many prejudices against us. We have done grandly. When we look at the grand results we can justly claim a splendid victory. We have polled more than 1,000,000 votes; we have more than doubled our representatives in the Senate and House and we will hold the balance of power in the Senate. Of the vast number who voted for you, hardly any expected your election. Our party was fighting for position. This it won, and with it victory.

Mr. Harrison was badly beaten. He had no personal strength or influence to our presence in the field, which enabled him to secure electoral votes by pluralities north of the Ohio, which he could never have secured by majorities in a contest narrowed to the Republicans on the one side and the Democrats on the other. Take from Mr. Cleveland the electoral votes north of the Ohio, which he got by virtue of pluralities, and he fails of an election by some twelve or fifteen electoral votes.

Mr. Cleveland wins the office with its responsibilities, with many pledges made by friends (some of them inconsistent). We win our position with only the duty of patient fidelity and watchfulness.

Our ship must ride the storm on the outside, but our anchor has been thrown with in the harbor. Let us maintain our position, complete our organization, close up our ranks, continue the campaign of education, doing justice to both old parties. In all they do well we will aid and approve. In all they do wrong we will condemn and oppose.

In the near future, thus acting, we will succeed.

For right is right, as God is God. And right the day will win. To doubt is to be disloyal. To falter is to sin.

Our party of the South will watch with interest for the lead of the more powerful West and Northwest, and I hope you will pledge to the revolutionists to support us all the advantages of the more compact organizations of the two grand sections.

In Mr. Cleveland's Administration I hope the promise of his friends and the just expectations of the people will be fully realized in a national prosperity. If so, well; if not, then the wrongs of the people will cry aloud for redress through our party.

Upon the tariff I do not believe Mr. Cleveland's Administration will come up to the expectations of the country. Upon the currency, free silver and cognate questions, I believe it will utterly fail. I think I already see some evidence of this. I am very confident that those two great questions are not going to be met either promptly or squarely. A policy of how not to do the thing will be resorted to.

A Manly Attitude.

Every elector knows that to an alarming extent, both in the United States and Canada, the electorate has been debauched by designing politicians. To secure office, pledges have been given by candidates to friends and those who may be influenced to become supporters, and the people's heritage has been thus dishonestly bartered away. It is alike culpable to purchase votes by promises to purchase positions to individuals or to bribe a constituency by the promise of the expenditure of money on public works therein.

It is pleasing, therefore, to know that the President-elect, in the neighboring States was able to win his famous friends, who last fall approached Mr. Cleveland to secure a promise that he would accept their nomination as electors, to certain persons, who desired particularly to control. His reply to these men was as follows:

"I can promise nothing. This nomination has come to me unsought. It has been the evident purpose of the people of the United States that I should lead the Democratic party at this time. I am making great sacrifices to do it. It is not my desire, neither is it my purpose, to be treated treacherously by the Democratic leaders. I expect you, therefore, gentlemen, to support the Democratic ticket nominated at Chicago with earnestness and loyalty. Otherwise, in place of the letter of acceptance of the nomination which I am expected to write, I shall write a letter of declination, and I will give my reasons. In brief, I expect that you will support the ticket loyally; else I will decline the nomination; and, further, if at any time during the progress of the campaign I have evidence that the Democratic party is not living thorough support, I shall then write a letter withdrawing the letter of acceptance which I

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
