THE WEATHER.

Toronto, Feb. 22—11 p.m.—The depression which was near the lakes last night has since developed great energy, and now covers the Maritime Provinces as a severe storm. Another depression covers the Missouri Valley. A heavy fog prevails in Eastern Canada, attended by snow. Snow is also falling in Manitoba.

Minimum and maximum temperatures: Esquimalt, 40°-42°; Calgary, 28°-36°; Qu'Appelle, 14°-20°; Winnipeg, 6° below-18°; Toronto, 14°-26°; Montreal, 8°-22°; Quebec, 2°-18°; Halifax, 12°-36°.
