

# The Garbage Question

Again Discussed by the Board of Health.

The Action Taken at Last Meeting Declared Illegal.

The Sanction of the Provincial Board of Health Necessary - A House to House Inspection Ordered-Useless Advice From the City Solicitor-Arthur Flanagan to be Prosecuted for Expos ing Diseased Beef for Sale,

Ald. Heaman (chairman), Moule, Parnell, Stevely and Scarrow, ex-Ald. Skinner, Dr. Gardiner, Dr. English, Dr. Hutchinson, Inspector Bell and Secretary Bell attended last evening's meeting of the Board of Health. The city solicitor's opinion on THE GARBARE CHISTICO.

THE GARBAGE QUESTION
was read. The Public Health Act provided was read. The Fublic Health Act provided that whenever the Province appeared to be threatened with any formidable epidemic, the Provincial Board of Health might issue regulations providing for the cleaning of streets and yards by the local health authorities. No such regulations had been issued and at present the board had power only to remove dirt from private premises, and had no general power where no nusiance existed to enter private property for the purpose of compelling the removal of garbage.

Dr. Gardiner moved that the board concondemn the garbage as a nuisance.

Ald. Searrow thought that the action taken at the last meeting of the beard in letting the contract for the collection of garbage was illeged and should be rescinded although the contract had not been signed.

The mayor moved accordingly. The board could then proceed and formulate a new scheme.

Dr. Hutchinson stated that the garbage from hotels and principal boarding houses in the city was collected and paid for by private arrangements, and he did not think that the proprietors would consent to it being removed without remuneration.

Dr. Gardiner urged the necessity of keeping yards clean and said that the board would not be doing its duty if it did not provide for the removal of garbage and keeping the yards in a good sanitary condition.

The mayor stated that the expectation of a cholera epidemic did not justify an illegal proceeding. In Hamilton, Toronto and other cities the garbage is collected on the same plan as it was proposed collecting it in this city, but the mayor stated that Toronto got special legislation to allow them to do this.

Dr. Gardiner contested the opinion that the action taken by the board at the last meeting was illegal.

The mayor's motion carried, Ald. Parnell and Dr. Gardiner voting nay.

Dr. Gardiner moved that a house-to-house inspection be ordered to be commenced as soon as possible after the snow disappears and to be finished not later than June 15, and that all parties be notified to have their yards put in a sanitary condition, and that if they do not do so within ten days that the vork will be done by the city at the citizens' expense. so within ten days that the work will be done by the city at the citizens' expense. Ald. Parnell seconded. Carried. The Provincial Board of Health will be requested to furnish this board with information as to the conditions under which the garbage is collected in Toronto and Hamilton, and also what would be necessary to make a house-to-house collection in this city legal.

THE CANCEROUS COW MATTER.

The city solicitor replied in answer to a communication from the board asking advice as to what should be done with regard to the recent exposure of diseased beef for sale on the market. He said that the person who offered the meat for sale could be prosecuted and that half the fine could be paid to the informant and the other half to the city.

The mayor moved that the medical health officer prosecute Arthur Flanagan, who exposed the beef, and that the city solicitor appear for the prosecution.

The oity solicitor's communication was deemed a useless answer to the request of the board, and Mr. Skinner and Ald. Parnell moved that his letter be returned. The board expected advice as to whether or not this particular case should be prosecuted, and the reply was too general and indefinite.

The medical health officer reported that there had been only 18 cases of infectious disease in the city and few deaths. The city was in a fairly good sanitary condition.

The chairman complained of the manner that infectious cases were looked after, styling it a perfect farce. If the doctors

did not report these cases, they should be made to do ss; and if the medical health officer did not do his duy, he should be told about it. Majones, whose son had died at his he on Waterloo street, said Dr. Hutchin. I had never visited the place, while the doctor said in the papers that he had by

doctor said in the papers that he had b? there.

In reply to this Dr. Hutchinson stated that the place had been properly placarded, and that the child was dead two or threweeks when the family left the house. To carpets and clothing in the stck room had been burned and the house disinfected every day for two weeks. He could not call these things to mind at the last meeting of the board, but on consulting his books he found these to be the facts.

In reply to Ald. Heaman the doctor stated that he had last visited the house the day after the last board meeting. Dr. Drake keep thim informed of the case up to that time.

Ald. Parnell, speaking of Dr. Hutchisson's statement, said that when such statements were made before the board they should be consistent with the facts.

Dr. Hutchinson, replying to Ald. Parnell, stated that he was sick on the Saturday, and had to be driven to and from the Market Square. The doctors did their duty very well as regards reporting infectious diseases. He thought it was too had to deprive a poor man of his right to work when only a mild case existed at his house.


