STREET WATERING BYLAW. When the bylaw, fixing the street vatering area and the rate, had been 8,000 feet were before parks and public buildings, and 40,000 feet more were exempt as corner lots, thus leaving a produceable area of 216,000 feet. To produce the necessary amount a rate of 4 cents per foot, an increase over last year of 1 cent per foot, must be made. It would give \$8,640, and the estimate was \$8,578, a difference of \$62. Ald. Cooper wanted to know what was the idea of corner lot exemptions.

He maintained that a ratepayer benefited by the watering on both sides. The present plan would please the owners of down town corner lots, but was a hardship to the poorer Ald. Parnell said that the council must avoid class legislation. He contended that if it became necessary to

pay rates on both sides of a corner lot, the increase would be felt by as many poor people as rich. Ald. Jolly moved that the assessment commissioner supply figures regarding the total number of feet for frontage rates, the number of feet exempted and the area at intersections. Ald. Greenlees objected to an in-crease in the rate, especially if the ratepayers had to pay for streets about parks and public buildings.

The mayor explained that the increase was due to increases in tenders for the work.

Ald. Stevely explained further that last year's rate was too low, as shown by the deficit of \$600. There had not been an increase of one cent over what the rate last year should have been. The taxes, said the mayor, were due in July, and the collector could do nothing until he had the rolls. If Ald. Jolly's motion carried the city clerk's work would be set back a couple of weeks and the collector would be delayed an equal period.

Ald. Parnell suggested that the matter be laid over to be dealt with by making a recommendation to the next Ald. Jolly changed his motion so as to have the information by Thursday

but when put his motion was lost. Ald. Campbell then moved in amnument to the bylaw that the cost of watering before parks and public buildings be, charged to the general Ald. Gerry also moved that a change
