DID HE HEAR JENNIE LIND

In Toronto as Much as Fifty Years Ago?

How Tickets Were Sold and How an Old-Time Londoner Labored to Hear the Swedish Nightingale.

"Our own personal recollections of Jenny Lind were at least 10 years ago, and some might think painful, but let that pass. If our memory serves us right, Jenny Lind visited Toronto, Ontario, in the fifty-one or two's. The admission to the St. Lawrence Hall was cheap. Toronto then was not much larger than Eau Claire. Now she boasts of 200,000 people. "The tickets were \$4, or what was known as a "pound note" each. This was too much to squander on the future "Major" and "Colonel," at that time respectively 13 and 10 years old. So the "two pounds" to be blown in by the Atkinson family were for the benefit of two older and more musically inclined members of the family. "The major's people at that time kept what was known as the "Dublin and Manchester House," No. 3 King street, East Toronto. Across from that ever to be remembered establishment diagonally was the renowned concern known as Nonce's music store. This was where the tickets for the Jenny Lind concert were to be sold, and 9 o'clock a. m. was the hour. "First come, first served," was the order of the day. Two one-pound notes were handed young Atkinson with instructions to rush, but alas! the crowd was so great and the pressure so terrific that it was impossible for a thin, slender lad of some 12 or 13 years, known then as "Lanky Bill" to wrestle with a mob so great. After repeated repulses at the hands, elbows and heels of burly citizens, and having been warned by white-gloved policemen to keep back, "G'wan wid yees now," the impetuous "major" beat an ignominious retreat and fell back into the arms of two well-known citizens, to-wit: Mountjoy, in hats and caps; and Rice Lewis, in hardware. "Well, I declare if it ain't young Atkinson. Say Willie, you are trying to get tickets for your folks; now I'll tell you what. We'll make it all right if you get us five tickets, and I'll tell you how to work it. I've seen it done, haven't you, Lewis?" continued Mr. Mountjoy. "Here are five pounds. Cram it well down in your pocket and we will leave you up on the top of the crowd and they will fire you clean into the music store. Or you are in, you're all right, they will let you out at the rear."

"It was accordingly so done. But was the poor major fired into the music store then and there? Not by a jug full. He was tossed hither and thither at the risk of falling a sacrifice to the angry passions of the infuriated multitude, poked and jabbed by walking canes and umbrellas, and "cussed" till at length he was snatched by the nape of his neck by the inside captain of police, dragged forward, more dead than alive, and landed on the floor of the music store. After the general had been fired into out of him, the dignitary remarked: "I've a good mind to run yees in, and it wasn't that your father and I are both Tipperary men, I'd do it. The day of your lying up there on top of them gentlemen, kickin' and punchin' silk hats be the dozen. Now, be after gettin' yer tickets, G'wan now." And this is all we remember about Jenny Lind.

WRECKS OF 1901

Statistics of Loss of Lives and Damage of Vessels.

Detroit, June 30.—In the first report of the season issued by W. L. Moore, of the weather bureau, official mention is made of 44 wrecks that have taken place on the great lakes, between April 16, when navigation opened, and May 31. In these 43 lives were lost and damages to hulls amounting to \$140,250 was done, while cargoes were damaged to the extent of \$18,000.

The wreck of the Baltimore on May 24 in Lake Huron was the most serious one of the whole number from the standpoint of loss of life. Thirteen out of the crew of 15 were lost. The loss on the vessel is given at \$35,000, and that on the cargo as \$4,000.

The burning of the Bon Voyage in Lake Superior on the 10th cost four lives and entailed a damage of \$25,000 to the boat. Another important accident was the collision between the Oglebay and the Jupiter, when damages to the amount of \$10,000 was done to the Oglebay and \$5,000 to the Jupiter.

WOMEN SENTENCED

Mrs. Prince-Kennedy Gets Ten Years and Jessie Morrison Five.

Kansas City, June 30.—Mrs. Lulu Prince-Kennedy was formally sentenced by Judge Wofford yesterday to serve ten years in the state penitentiary in the matter of her husband's murder. Philip Kennedy, in the corridor of the Ridge building in January last. She heard the sentence without the slightest display of emotion. After the sentence Charles H. Nearing, leading counsel for Mrs. Kennedy, stated that he expected to appeal the case to the supreme court, but that it had not been decided whether she would immediately begin her sentence. Evidently, Kansas City, June 30.—Miss Jessie Morrison, who was yesterday convicted of the murder of Mrs. Olin Castle and given a sentence of five years in the state penitentiary, at Lansing, today, through her attorneys served notice in court of a motion for a new trial. Judge Aikman set the hearing for next Saturday.

MANY DEPRIVED OF THEIR VOTES

By the Proposed Suffrage Clause in Alabama's Constitution.

Montgomery, Ala., June 30.—A suffrage and elections article for the proposed new constitution was submitted to the constitutional convention yesterday. It provides that, to vote at any election a citizen shall have resided in the state at least two years, county one year and precinct or ward three months preceding the election, and he shall have been duly registered and shall have paid all poll taxes due. Following are the persons disqualified both from registering and from voting. All idiots and insane persons, those who shall be disqualified from voting at the time of the ratification of this constitution and those who shall have been convicted of treason, murder, arson, embezzlement, malfeasance in office, bribery, or any crime involving property under false pretences, perjury, subornation of perjury, robbery, assault with intent to rob, forgery, bribery, assault and battery on the wife, bigamy, living in adultery, receiving stolen property, sodomy, incest, rape, miscegenation, crime against nature, or any crime punishable by imprisonment in the penitentiary, or of any infamous crime or crimes involving moral turpitude; also persons who shall have been convicted as vagrants and tramps, and any person who shall sell or offer to sell his vote or the vote of another, or who shall buy or offer to buy the vote of another, in any election by the people or in any primary election or to procure the nomination or election of any person to any office or who shall suborn any witness or registrar to secure the registration of any person as an elector.

BY SIX MASKED MEN

Rich Family Tortured and Robbed—The Ruffians Secure Much Booty.

Wheeling, W. Va., June 30.—Six masked men entered the palatial summer residence of Jacob L. White, at Brothers station, on the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad, over-powered, bound and gagged the seven occupants of the house and ransacked for valuables. They secured \$3,000 in money and jewelry, and a quantity of other valuables, but their daughter were tortured by having lighted matches applied to their bodies and their skin lacerated by needles in an effort to make them divulge the hiding place of other valuables, but without success. The victims were deserted and lay helpless for hours until Miss Sidney Mackey, a niece, extricated herself from her bonds and secured assistance.

There is no clue to the identity of the robbers. White is a millionaire oil operator. The victims are not in a serious condition.
