THE FIGHTING WAS STUBBORN.

Between Capt. Wood's Constabulary and the Boers—Enemy Lost 23 Killed.

Pretoria, Aug. 22.—Capt. Wood, of the Constabulary, with a hundred men, including some of Morley's Scouts, a command made up partly of former burghers, made a night march and surprised a Boer laager Saturday morning, 20 miles northeast of the Springs. They surrounded the Boers on three sides, and poured in a hot fire at 200 yards range, the Boers sallying in confusion. It is known for certain that

23 BOERS WERE KILLED, but the number is probably greater. Numbers of the Boers managed to stream out on one side of the laager. The British retired, but found their line of retreat blocked by another body of Boers, which was coming up. The

situation was perilous, and a hand-to-hand fight ensued. Fine bravery was shown. Capt. Morley was severely wounded. Three Boers attacked Capt. Wood and pulled him off his horse. Capt. Wood smashed the face of one of the Boers with his riding whip, took his rifle and remounted and escaped. There were other similar incidents. During the melee nearly all the prisoners who were taken in the fight escaped.

SURPRISED A LAAGER.

Capt. Benson surprised a laager at Warm Baths, near Carolina, killing two and capturing 20. Among the latter were Commandant De Villiers, father-in-law of Acting President Schalk Burger, and Capt. Breytenbach. The number of prisoners that arrived at Pretoria during the past week was the largest for months.

FAVOR MASTERS' SIDE

Latest Developments of the Steel Men's Strike.

Pittsburg, Pa., Aug. 22.—The developments in the steel strike this morning were all favorable to the masters. Early this morning the American Tin Plate Company succeeded in getting about a hundred men safely landed inside the gates of the Star plant on Twelfth street in this city, and preparations were in progress for starting up two mills before the close of the day.

THE LATE MRS. ROSS

Had Intended to Remain All Winter in Victoria.

Many Londoners, as well as residents of the Northwest, were shocked to learn of the death of Mrs. Ross, her child, and niece, Miss McKay, in the awful islander disaster. Mrs. Ross was for many years, before his appointment to the Yukon, minister of public works in the Territories, and as such was known to almost every settler. Mr. and Mrs. Ross and their family resided in Regina, and citizens of the Territorial capital, therefore, feel most keenly for Commissioner Ross, and his motherless children.

Principal D. J. Goggin, of the Regina Normal School, who, with Mrs. Goggin, was visiting at Port Hope, only learned of the accident late on Tuesday afternoon, and were shocked beyond measure to learn of the tragic fate of one who had been for many years a near neighbor and close friend. Principal Goggin explained how Mrs. Ross came to be separated from both her husband and her older children on this fatal trip.

First went into the Yukon as commissioner, Mrs. Ross, their five children, and Miss McKay, their niece, who had always lived with them, went to reside with Mrs. Ross's mother, in Victoria, B. C. This year the government built Mr. Ross a house at Dawson, but the work was delayed, and it was evident the house would not be fit for occupation this coming winter. There were some details of the building Mr. Ross was unable to decide on, and Mrs. Ross went to Dawson to decide on these. The four older children, two boys and two girls, were left in Victoria, but the youngest and Miss McKay accompanied Mrs. Ross. Mrs. Ross was, therefore, coming back from this visit in order to remain this winter in Victoria, when the lamentable accident occurred.
