### THE LATE MRS. ROSS

#### Had Intended to Remain All Winter in Victoria.

Many Londoners, as well as residents of the Northwest, were shocked to learn of the death of Mrs. Ross, her child, and niece, Miss McKay, in the awful Islander disaster, Mr. Ross was for many years, before his appointment to the Yukon, minister of public works in the Territories, and as such was known to almost every settler.
