

## TODAY'S MARKET WELL ATTENDED

### LOCAL MARKET.

London, Tuesday, March 10.

The market today was well attended by the farmers. The snow which fell last night made a big improvement in the roads and consequently there was a larger supply of hay and oats. The demand was good for all of the produce offered and prices were firm. Saturday's quotations: Grain—Oats sold at \$1.50 per cwt for inferior and \$1.55 to \$1.58 for the best lots. Barley sold at \$1.35 per cwt, and wheat went at 92c per bushel.

Hay and Straw—Although there were 35 loads of hay on the stand, they were all sold by 11:30, and prices were a little higher at \$14 to \$15 per ton for choice, and \$12 to \$14 for timothy. Straw in better demand at \$8 per ton.

Butter and Eggs—Butter sold very quickly at 30c to 32c for pound rolls in basket, 10c, and 25c to 30c for crocks. Eggs sold at 25c per dozen wholesale.

Vegetables and Roots—Potatoes were very scarce at 5c bag whole sale and \$1 retail. Kibbards scarce at \$1 dozen. Lettuce, 35c dozen. Turnips, 10c per bag. Onions, 10c per bushel. Apples—Sales and prices are steady. Poultry sold at Saturday's prices.

The supply of butchers' meat was small and prices steady.

Dressed Hogs—Nearly one hundred carcasses offered which sold at \$7 and \$7.25 per cwt. Some heavy hogs sold at \$6.75 per cwt.

A small lot of seed sold at \$2.75 per bushel, and a small load of beans at \$1.50 per bushel.
