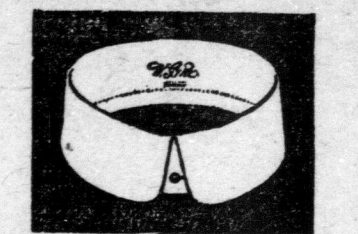

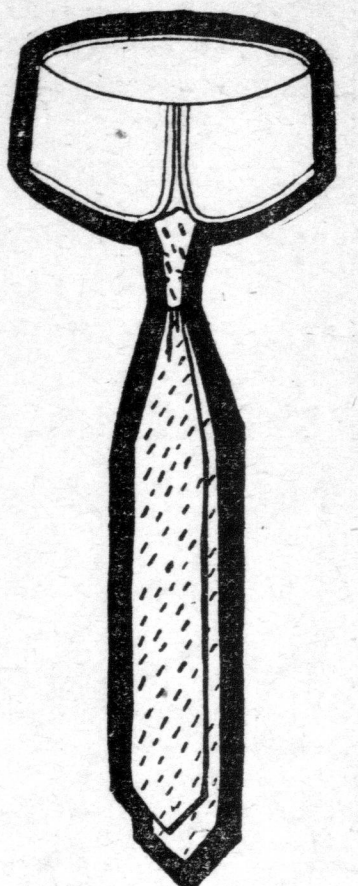

A Warning.
