4:30—Visiting Old Boys' race, 75 yard. First, second, third, \$8.
4:40—Special event.
4:50—Quarter-mile bicycle, high wheel. First, second, third.
5:00—Boys' race, under 15 years. First, second, third, fourth, fifth, \$6.

The floats will assemble on Wellington street, near Victoria Park, and will leave Victoria Park at 8 o'clock sharp. It will proceed south on Wellington street to south side of Dundas street, Dundas street to Ridout street, Ridout street to Fullarton street, Fullarton street to Richmond street, Richmond street to Queen's avenue, Queen's avenue to Adelaide street, Adelaide street to Dundas street, Dundas street to Queen's Park, ring entrance. Then to the grandstand.

Order of the Mardi Gras Procession.
Announcement Float—This will contain announcements which will inform the people concerning the procession.
Seventh Regiment Band.
High school cadets, the guard of honor for the Queen of the carnival at the coronation ceremony.

Canadian Float—This float will show Miss Canada, attended by nine young ladies representing the different provinces, each in characteristic costume. The float will be drawn by four horses and will be attended by South African veterans.

Floral Float—This is in charge of Mr. W. W. Gammon, and will be one of the prettiest floats imaginable.

American Float—This will show the Goddess of Liberty on an elevated platform, attended by six pages. Forty-six young ladies, representing every state in the Union, and seven other young ladies representing territories, will also be seen, garbed in characteristic costumes. This float will be splendidly illuminated by hundreds of electric lights, and is extremely handsome. Preceding the float will be a drag in which John Bull and Uncle Sam will be shown. Uncle Sam will be John Bull's guest on this occasion.

Scotch Float—This will be decorated with the Scotch Thistle and other Scottish emblems. A pipers' band will attend, and it will be drawn by Clydesdale horses.

Route of Old Boys' March
From City to Queen's Park

The Old Boys' procession will leave the corner of Richmond and Dundas streets Monday at 1:30 p. m. sharp. Every section must be in readiness to make the start.

The route will be—Richmond street to Queen's avenue, east on Queen's avenue to Adelaide street, south on Adelaide street to Dundas street and east on Dundas street to Queen's Park, and then around the track in front of the grandstand.

The marshals were appointed, as follows—Grand marshal, Walter Bartlett; Marshals, J. W. Metherall, James McCormick, Ed. Smith, W. C. Coe, Harry Dyson, J. J. Dyer, H. Abel and John McLean.

The procession committee of the Old Boys met last evening at the city hall, and decided on the route of the procession on Monday afternoon as well as appointed marshals for the parade.

The procession was divided into sections, and each section will have a different meeting place. They will all fall in at a certain point and move in with the big procession.

The sections were arranged as follows:
Section 1—The section will assemble on Dundas street between Richmond and Talbot streets. It will consist of the mayor and council, the board of education, separate school board, city officials, police and Seventh Regiment band.

Section 2 will assemble on the east side of Talbot street north of Dundas. In this section will be the Ninety-First band, the Hamilton Old Boys, Toronto Old Boys, Hon. Adam Beck's prize

Section 6 will assemble on Carling street. The Citizens' band and the Old Boys from Winnipeg and the west will meet on the south side of Carling street.

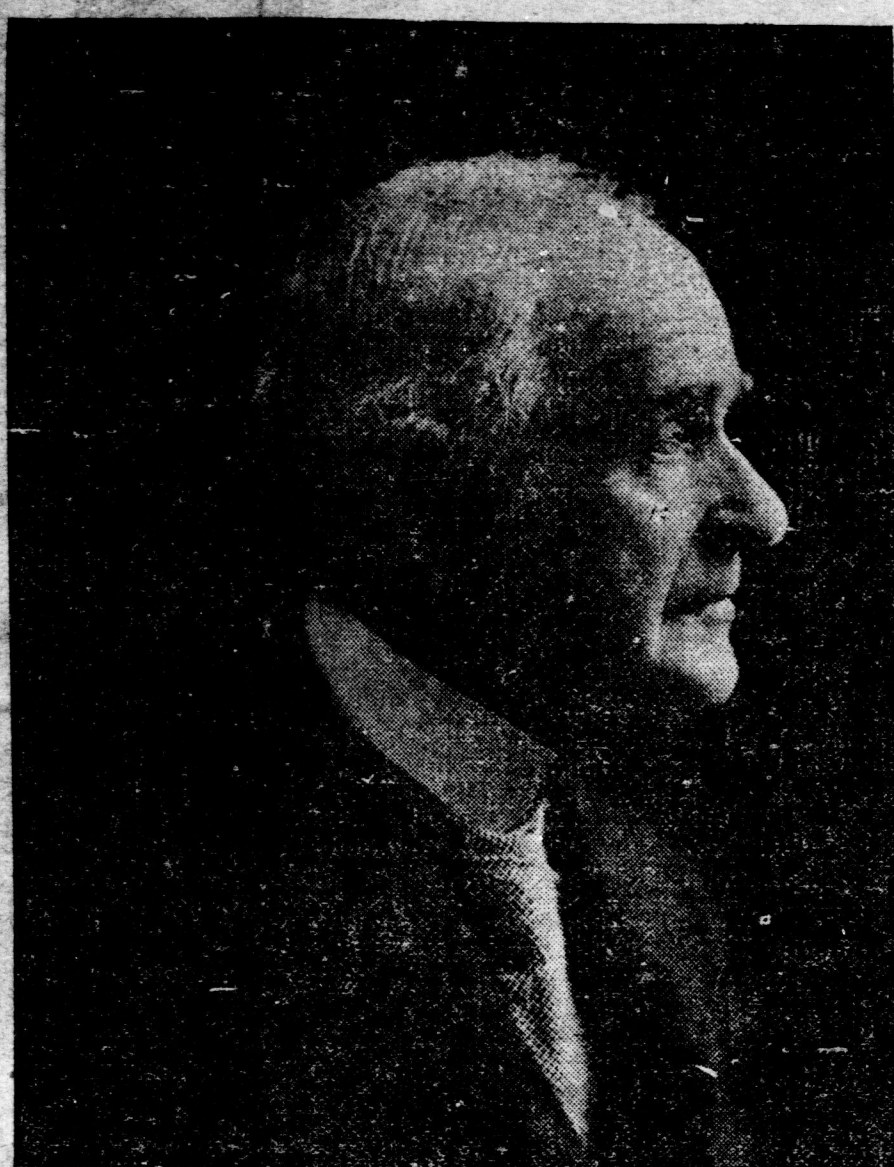
On the north side of Carling street will assemble the Port Huron Old Boys and band and the Sarnia Old Boys and the Petrolia Old Boys.

SOFT DRINKS ARE TOO HARD
SAYS INSPECTOR GALPIN

Consequently Certain Well-Known Citizens Were Hauled Into Court Today and One Was Fined—Other Cases To Be Heard Later.

It appears that certain persons have been selling alleged "soft drink," in London which are in the opinion of the authorities "hard" drinks, calculated to make the heavy heart feel light and the light head feel heavy.

Inspector Galpin "got wise," and at this morning's session of the police court the inspector was in the limelight all the time.

The first case tried was that of Robert Garner.

Mr. Garner is a dealer in cider, but Inspector Galpin charged him with breaking the law by selling liquor without a license.

Mr. Garner's cider, it was shown, was so hard that one might easily become intoxicated. Mr. Garner pleaded guilty and was fined \$50 and \$35 costs.

COLORED CANDIES BLAMED
FOR DEATH OF A LONDON GIRL

Josephine Armstrong Dies in Victoria Hospital After Two Weeks Illness—Physician Says Dyes in Candies Were Cause of Child's Dimise.

Josephine M. Armstrong, the 8-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. David Armstrong, died at Victoria Hospital early this morning, probably as a direct result of eating colored candies. The little girl had been sick for nearly two weeks, having been taken ill after eating a great many of the candies. Dr. Homer Black was in attendance and stated to The Advertiser that death was directly due to uremia, which was probably brought about by the absorption into the system of the poisonous colors used in the candies. It is not known where the child got the candies. The little girl was the second eldest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Armstrong, and was very popular with a wide circle of friends. The funeral will be held on Sunday afternoon to Mount Pleasant Cemetery.

Greek Doesn't Want Cart Smashed

William Gibson, of Westminster, Is in a Serious Condition in Victoria Hospital.

Struck a Post.

When in front of George Jackson's butcher shop the wagon swerved suddenly and struck a post, and the horse being brought to a halt kicked itself free.

It kicked through the dashboard, and one of its hoofs struck Mr. Gibson, fracturing his ankle.

He tried to climb out over the back of the rig, but the horse backed suddenly when he was part way out, and crushed him between a post and a wagon, breaking his leg and causing internal injuries.

Mr. Gibson was taken to Victoria Hospital in the city ambulance, and Dr. Williams who was called found him in a very serious condition.

Mr. Gibson has been in an unconscious condition ever since the accident. Both fractures were of the right leg.
