Behind the Footlights

"When All Has Been Said" is a strong play, and with a little more pruning, it is certain to be a success in New York and elsewhere. At least, that was the verdict of a comparatively small, but extremely critical audience at the Grand Opera House last night, where the play was presented. The company is strong, well-balanced, and most capable.

The story deals with the fortunes of the Gordon family. William Gordon is a young banker, in a small American city, with a wife and 7-year-old boy, and they are very happy. There is a campaign on for the mayoralty, and Gordon is induced to enter as the anti-saloon candidate. The liquor interests combine to defeat him by fair means or foul. They fall in an endeavor to wreck his bank, and he is apparently on the high road to success.

At this moment, a representative of the brewers, Kronstadt comes to the bank to play his trump card. Eight years before Kronstadt had tricked Mrs. Gordon into a mock marriage.

throws her into hysterics, and furnishes the best acting of the evening. However, through the intervention of the old family physician, the family is again united, the final curtain falling on a scene at once sombre, but replete with possibilities for future happiness.

Dealing as it does with two live American stage topics at the present time, politics and domestic relations, cleverly and well interwoven, it is bound to be a success.

The title is not well chosen, and in this the producer will undoubtedly make a change.

The acting was excellent. Miss Emily Stevens as Mrs. Gordon, was very clever, and in every scene satisfying. Her best work was done when she discovers that Kronstadt did not intend to reveal her past to her husband. In her confession scene she was excellent, although one could not help wishing that nature had endowed her with a voice of better carrying

power, and a trifle more expressive. However she is an actress of brilliant promise.

Charles Balsar as Gordon, got the best possible out of a strong role, and in every instance was satisfying. He scored last night and will continue to do so in that role.

One of the real hits of the play was the acting of Thomas Tobin, the 7-year-old son of the Gordons. Not once

"The White Squaw," a Play Founded

It is an old saying that truth is stranger than fiction, but it applies to the romantic American drama, "The White Squaw," booked for Friday and Saturday, Nov. 18 and 19, and Saturday matinee, at the Grand. Miss Clarke's play has its scenes in the forests of Michigan about a century ago, a period when America was really in the making. Welcome to Bernhardt.

Her engagement at Grand Opera House, London, occurs Thursday, Nov. 24. Sarah Bernhardt confesses to 67 years; in fact, she proclaims her age, yet she arrived only a few days ago to begin a long and arduous professional tour. In the course of which she will impersonate on the stage Marguerite Gautier, Joan of Arc, and the boy prince in L'Aiglon, as well as many other vivid characters. Perhaps countless thousands of young spectators will be thrilled and stirred by her acting, as they who have memories of Dona Sol of yore were stirred and thrilled when she first crossed the Atlantic. Mme. Bernhardt was just 23 years old; her press agent said so and all the newspapers believed him. She should be 63 now, but she was still the girl of the night of years then. Now she is proud of her age, and for once forgotten years are noted in her personal chronology.

She denies that she has come here to die. The denial was suspicious, of course. Neither is she compelled to work for her bread. Bernhardt is still young enough to thirst for fame. But she has made up her mind. "Blow wind, come wrack, at least she will die with harness on her back."

Her engagement here will positively be her last. Mail orders for seats are now being received when accompanied by check or money order made payable to the theatre. The mail orders take precedence over the regular seat sale, which opens at Grand Opera House, London, on Monday, Nov. 21, at 9 a.m.

PARIS SUFFERING FROM SEINE FLOOD

Many Subterranean Passages Filled With Water—Poor in Low Districts Suffer.

Paris, Nov. 14.—There has been no abatement of the flood from the River Seine, which continues to rise. The gauge at Pont Royal marks a height of 6.93 metres, which is 3.45 metres above the normal, and somewhat higher than that estimated a few days ago for this date. The river authorities, although the tributaries and sources of the Seine are reported to be falling, estimate that the rise will continue until Thursday, when it is expected the flood will reach a maximum of 7.20 metres, a little more than two metres short of the disastrous floods of last January.

The low quarters at the eastern end of the city and part of the Jardin des Plantes, or the Natural History, are now inundated, and the subterranean passages to the Austere station are flooded, gangways being improvised for passengers. The cellars of the Palais de Justice, the Conciergerie and the prefecture of police are full of water. M. Lepine, the prefect of Paris, has installed traction engines and dynamos in the courtyard to supply electricity for the offices.

The fine weather of Sunday brought out a vast throng to watch the swollen river race by, but at night rain again began to fall.

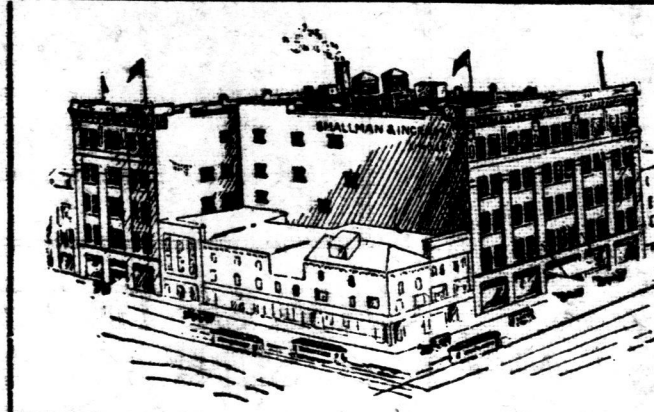
The suburbs are suffering immense damage. The River at Amiens is overflowing its banks, flooding the lower floors of houses. The poor in the eastern suburbs, who were so heavily stricken last January, are again suffering almost as severely. Many of the residents have already moved out.

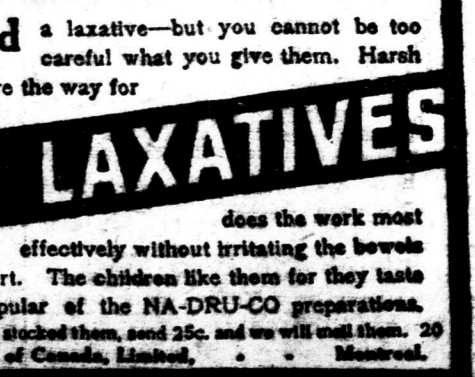
If Oleson's slayer is captured he may be roughly handled. His victim was wearing a red coat and cap to lessen the chances of anyone mistaking him for a deer.
