The injury to the right arm was the most serious, and it would take him nearly a year and a half to recover the use of the severed nerve. He would never have its use fully, and there is danger that the severed nerve may not unite. To Mr. McEvoy witness stated that there were four of the wounds caused by a sharp instrument, such as a knife.

Washington, Jan. 16.—The supply of information as to the tendencies and conclusions of the reciprocity negotiations in progress here has during the past two days materially increased. Since the last dispatches, your correspondent has come into possession through nearly a score of interviews with Republicans high in the confidence of the Administration, and through other trustworthy channels, of what, I believe, may be accepted as through other trustworthy channels, of what, I believe, may be accepted as a fair summary of the trade deliberations thus far.
