The Portrait of the Savior.
To the Editor of The Advertiser:
In a short address last, Professor W. D. Whit, of Victoria University, found grave fault with the conventional portraits of Jesus as handed down to us by the old masters. They represented him, the speaker said, "as a man rather than a deity, with pale face, sunken hair and beard, benevolent eyes, and dressed in flowing white garments." The professor argued that as Jesus was a carpenter, and therefore used to hard, manual toil, he must have been well developed physically. Every trade was sure to leave its own peculiar mark, and hence the long, slender fingers seen in paintings of Jesus were not those of a carpenter. He carried a carpenter's tool, and could not as a Jew have been pale-faced, as the Syrians were invariably dark or brown skinned. Neither could he have worn the conventional white garments, as owing to his manner of life he often slept in fishermen's boats and in other places where white material would become soiled and unsightly in appearance. The professor

seemed also to denude the meek, benignant eyes and features seen in the great paintings of Jesus as too effeminate for so great a leader of men. Speaking as a teacher of Greek, "Master," as addressed to Jesus by Greek, equivalent for our word "Boss," as applied to Jesus by the modern men. The physical appearance of Jesus, therefore, the speaker thought, was entirely in keeping with the idea which the latter word conveyed; that is, he was a "Boss," or dictator, and looked the part.

All this seems plausible enough on the surface, and there is considerable truth in it, but in my humble judgment, such attempts to rehabilitate Jesus in a garb and manner more acceptable to the conventional representation of a deity, are unwelcome. In dealing with a subject of this kind, where, in the nature of the case, much is left to the imagination, it seems doubtful taste to quarrel with the masters in their own giving field. They evidently aimed at a representation of Jesus as a man of countenance to Jesus as would best represent the dominant features of his character, holiness, etc., and the speaker, in his attempt to make Jesus more human, has done so at the expense of his divinity. The conventional portraits of Jesus, in view of the completed life of Jesus, when doubtless he would be less robust, and the sterner features would be softened and mellowed by sorrow and by the deep shadow of impending suffering. Jesus doubtless was something of a dictator, and this was in accordance with his nature as a man of heart, his unselfish kindness and his unswerving devotion to truth and duty that captivated the people of his day, and that still holds in ever-tightening grip the heart of humanity.

A PLEASANT EVENING WITH MRS. BROWNING

Lecture Last Night By Rev Dr. Manning, of Dundas Centre Methodist Church.

Rev. Dr. Manning proved himself a delightful lyceum speaker when he lectured last evening in Dundas Centre Methodist Church on "Elizabeth Barrett Browning and Her Husband, Robert Browning." The lecture was given under the auspices of the Ladies' Aid of the church and was well attended. Elizabeth Barrett wrote poetry when a child of 7, and her husband had a small volume of poems printed at the age of 12. But they were both well advanced in life before they came to know each other. Browning was a beautiful woman in many ways. To quote the lecturer's words: "Her body was born for sensitiveness, her mind for learning, her heart and imagination for love." During the courtship of the two poets Browning wrote to her some 90 letters, ranging in length from 50 to 150 lines. Her letters to him were as lengthy as 230 lines. The romantic attachment of love between the two poets was the subject of the evening's program. Dr. Manning gave an interpretative reading of some of Mrs. Browning's best poems. Her poetry, published under the heading of "De Profundis," was inspired by her intense grief for the death of her brother by drowning. "Lady Geraldine's Courtship" is by many regarded as her best poem. "The Cry of the Children" embodied her sentiments on philanthropy and social reform. She was largely interested in the social betterment of the classes, and devoted an attention to the subject of socialism that was unusual in her time. "Aurora Leigh" expresses certain radical conceptions of social betterment, and would result to one level the different heights of social rank and condition. It was a great favorite with George Eliot, Elizabeth Stuart Phelps, and others.

Dr. Manning also read examples of her "Sonnets From the Portuguese," and other poems of this brilliant woman writer.

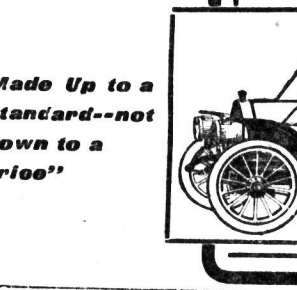
